Hoxie Speaks At Kiwanis Club Lunch

Not a pipe dream but a pipefitter's idea has saved seven days on each tanker built at Swan Island yards of Henry Kaiser, Inc. Tommy Hoxie, public relations man for the yards, told Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday.

Hoxie, formerly with KSLM here, told also how the company has encouraged its employees to share their ideas, thus greatly increasing efficiency and at the same time giving workmen an opportunity to cash in on their ingenuity.

The ingenuity of Americans, and particularly of farmers, who Hoxie declares are the best shipbuilders, has been the cause of the great productivity of the Kaiser companies, the speaker declared.

Boxes like postboxes over the yard yawn to receive the written comments, ideas, rough sketches of the men and women who build the ships and who sometimes see ways of speeding production those who make the plans might not otherwise even imagine, Hoxie indicated.

The working labor-management committee in the AFL-closed shop yards was credited by Hoxie with the fact that no time has been lost from work stoppage.

Photographs of the yards of parts of tankers under construction and of living quarters of workmen were shown by Hoxie. Moving pictures he had planned to bring to Salem were undergoing scrutiny in Washington and would return to the coast later, he said.

Although the average hourly wage has increased 40 cents, construction costs under such a system have dropped by more than 50 per cent. Producing three tankers every two weeks currently, Swan Island yards need 5000 more workers, the speaker declared.

Youths Rob Salem Cars, Caught Later

Three Salem cars were burglarized Monday night while they stood parked in the Union Service station at Church and State streets. Articles taken from these cars, together with an electric fan stolen from the G. K. Talmage car parked alongside The Statesman office, were recovered late Monday night in Albany in the hands of four Albany and Lebanon youths.

Talmage, who works in The Statesman composing room, spotted the youths attempting to "lift" a spotlight. He and fellow employees obtained the license number of the vehicle in which the prowlers were riding. They were picked up in Albany where under the back seat was found various articles, some of which belonged to Lyle Leighton, 754 Mill street, who had reported the theft of three dozen arrows, quivers, a cigarette lighter, a flashlight and steering wheel knob, and Rose Battalion, 525 Hood, from whose car a clock, gear knob, cigarette lighter and steering knob had been taken. The Leighton and Battalion cars were both parked in the service station at Church and State streets.

The youths were booked and the driver committed to jail awaiting juvenile court action. The driver and girl with him were both 17 years of age and they were accompanied by a 14 year old boy and girl.

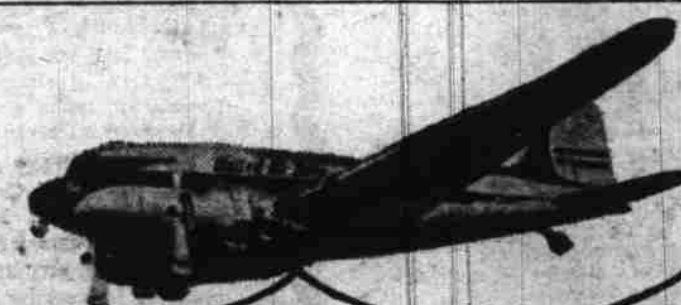
