Steelhammer Both Demo., GOP Choice

John Steelhammer, by virtue of receiving 21 democratic write-in votes for state representative, Marion county, at the recent primary election, is eligible to have his name on both the republican and democratic ballots at the November election, the state department announced Wednesday.

Steelhammer received the highest republican vote for the state representative at the primary election and won his party nomination. There were no candidates on the democratic ballot.

Paul Hendricks, Lewis Judson and Walter Lampkin, republican candidates for state representative at the primary election, each received 19 democratic write-in votes, but Lampkin and Judson could not have accepted the democratic nomination because they were not successful in the republican primary contest.

Whether Steelhammer will accept the democratic nomination has not been determined here.

St. Paul Sets Annual Rodeo

ST. PAUL, June 22.—(P)—Cowboys will attempt to drive blindfolded, unbroken broncos around this city's rodeo arena in the highlight of St. Paul's ninth annual wild west show July 2-4.

The broncos for the "wild horse race" will be brought here from the Warm Springs Indian reservation. The St. Paul rodeo, which directors claim offers more prize money than any other Oregon rodeo except the Pendleton roundup, will feature Pat Fisk, Walla Walla, 1941 calf roping champion; Barney Willis, last year's high scorer from White Salmon; and George Nelson, Wamic, perennial performer here.

Adair Artists Show Work In Portland

CAMP ADAIR, June 22.—Four 70th division soldier artists were among seven from Camp Adair whose paintings were hung in the Portland art museum's all-Oregon show, now in progress in the Rose city, and two of their entries have been sold already.

The Trailblazers are Cpl. Samuel Ortega, Hq. 2nd Bn., 275th Infantry; Pfc. Sydney Fossum, Btry. C, 882nd field artillery; S/Sgt. Louis Schram, G-2 section, 70th div. hq.; and Pvt. Henry Jova, formerly with G-2 section, who has changed his station since painting his entries.

One of Jova's paintings, titled "Rite," and one of Ortega's "Abstraction in Pastels" have been purchased by Portlanders.

Other Adair men who are exhibiting are SCU men Paul Dannheiser, Tec5 Don Lynch, sentry staff artist, and Pfc. George H. Grimm.

The art museum, located at West Park and Madison, ordinarily shows only paintings by native Oregonians but this year by special arrangement is accepting work by army personnel located in the state.

The exhibition lasts until July 2.

Farrell Will Urge Hospital Law Repeal

Secretary of state Robert S. Farrell, jr., informed the state board of control at a meeting here Wednesday that he would appear before the 1945 legislature and urge repeal of the existing law under which relatives are compelled to pay for the support of patients in the Oregon state hospitals.

The assessment is now fixed at \$25 a month and between \$20,000 and \$25,000 monthly is obtained by the state from this source.

Farrell declared that the law is wrong in principle and has proved a hardship on many persons having relatives in the institutions. The assessment is waived in cases where relatives are financially unable to pay. Estates of patients also are subject to the assessment provided a court order is obtained.

Neither state treasurer Leslie M. Scott nor Gov. Earl Snell commented on Farrell's statement.

The board approved a request of Dr. John Evans, superintendent of the Oregon hospital here, to transfer 60 women patients to the eastern Oregon hospital at Pendleton.

A contract for waterproofing the administration building at the Monmouth normal school was awarded to Judd Beardsley, Salem, on a low bid of \$2476.
