Frank Cornett, Valley Native, Dies Thursday

Frank Davis Cornett, 84, native of the Willamette valley for two terms a member of the state house of representatives and for 70 years a member of the Christian church, died Thursday morning at the home of a stepdaughter, Mrs. Mayme Hill, 1274 Chmeketa street, with whom he had made his home the past two years.

Born at Bethel in Polk county, April 6, 1860, the son of William M. and Nancy Jane Cornett, Oregon pioneers, he was a nephew of Alexander McCarty, early evangelist who organized the First Christian church in Salem in or about the year 1854. He was baptized at the age of 14 years in La-Creole creek at the place now called Rickreall.

Mr. Cornett spent most of his life in the Willamette valley, with the exception of a few years in Wasco county. In eastern Oregon, he married Viola Powell, daughter of the family of pioneer preachers, Noah, John and Alfred Powell. They came to the Willamette valley to make their home on a farm a few miles east of Albany.

Twice he was elected to the state house of representatives from Linn county, first in 1903 and again in 1905. He was Sunday school superintendent of the old Central Christian church east of Albany for 25 years, often supplied as its preacher and was influential in inducing many young persons to unite with the church.

For more than 45 years he served his church as either deacon or elder and a few years ago was elected honorary elder of the Salem First Christian church for the remainder of his life.

Mr. Cornett's first wife died in 1913. In 1916 he married Mrs. Jessie Zumwalt, who died in 1928. He married Mrs. Rachel Wulf in 1929; she died in 1942. He then went to live in the home of Mrs. Hill, who with a number of nieces and nephews survives him.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, July 1, at 2 p. m. from the chapel of the W. T. Rigdon company, Rev. Dudley Strain of Salem First Christian church officiating. Interment will be in City View cemetery.

New Culvert Work Starts

The task of removing the two old wooden bridges which fork at the junction of market road 56 (penitentiary cutoff) with the airport road and replacing them with a culvert was begun Thursday morning by a county road crew and should be completed this weekend, Marion County Engineer Nate Hubbs has announced. The culvert addition will make possible a single entrance to the airport road from the cutoff, and its installation is considered a permanent improvement and a safety measure, Hubbs said.

The road may be closed a portion of today, he believes.

Cash on Hand For Postwar Construction

Cash already allocated or on hand for postwar construction projects in Oregon now aggregate \$73,000,000 or 22 per cent of the \$348,000,000 estimated projects suggested up to this time, the Oregon postwar development and readjustment commission reported to Gov. Earl Snell today.

The report, prepared by John W. Kelly, commission secretary, showed that the ready cash would provide employment for 36,000 men at \$1800 a year for the first 12 months following the close of the war. This is one-third of the estimated unemployment load.

The cash available for postwar projects, segregated by the commission, follows: State cash \$13,541,121, counties (26 counties) \$2,000,000; state highway commission \$10,000, Multnomah-Portland Moses plan \$24,000,000, Willamette valley \$20,000,000, Deschutes (1945 fiscal) \$1,250,000, municipalities \$750,000 and school districts \$700,000.

Kelly said a backlog of reserve finances is building up on all these items but 26 counties and 40 municipalities are ready to initiate plans as soon as men, equipment and materials are available.

Federal government plans for the Umatilla dam and river and harbor improvements virtually are completed but much of this work will have to be postponed until after the war, Kelly said.

Most of the school projects will require a four years tax levy. Some plans for school projects already have been completed by architects.

County Courts Can't Proclaim Legal Holiday

County courts have no authority to proclaim legal holidays, attorney general George Neuner held here Thursday, in reply to a telegram received from district attorney Charles E. Boardman of Deschutes county.

Legal holidays, Neuner said, are restricted to those provided by the legislature and those days which might be appointed by the President of the United States or the Governor of this state.

In another opinion Neuner held that the Oregon Racing commission funds, earmarked for the Pacific International Livestock Exposition and other shows, shall accumulate during the period of their suspension with expenditures restricted to necessary repairs and maintenance. When these shows resume operations they will receive their proportion of the accumulated funds.

Beneficiaries under the racing commission law, other than the Pacific International Exposition, are the Eastern Oregon Livestock show, Pendleton Roundup and Northwestern Turkey show.

Accident Victim Funeral Is Set

MT. ANGEL, June 29 — Funeral services for William Emory Fredericks, 30, who was killed early Thursday morning in a traffic accident near Brooks, will be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from Unger mortuary. Burial will be made in Silverton or Salem.

He was born March 22, 1913, in Independence and had lived at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Emory Fredericks, a mile north of Mt. Angel, for the last year. He came to this vicinity four years ago. Besides his parents, four sisters survive. They are Opal Marechek, Mt. Angel; Lucille Tate, Silverton; and Dorothy and Ruth Fredericks at home.

Dr. S. L. Boe Assigned To Pendleton District

Dr. S. L. Boe, Portland, has been assigned temporarily as deputy state veterinarian in the eastern Oregon district with headquarters in Pendleton, the state agricultural department reported Thursday.

Dr. Boe is a graduate of the veterinary department of Washington State college.

Pear Psylla Is Found In Freewater Tree

State agricultural department officials reported Thursday that a specimen of pear psylla has been found in a pear tree in the Freewater district, eastern Oregon, a short distance south of a similar infestation discovered late last year.

A spray program has been set up to eradicate the pest.
