

Woodburn Bond Sales Lagging

Area Reports 53 Per Cent of Quota Subscribed

WOODBURN — With a little over \$45,000 in cash turned in by 43 solicitors, Woodburn has reached the 53 percent quota in the Fifth War Loan drive toward the \$113,000 quota, this is little more than double the amount of last week.

Hubbard has raised about 38 percent of her quota, also more than doubling her achievement of a week ago.

Dean Bishoprick, chairman of the drive in the combined area, says the drive is lagging. More and larger bonds must be sold, and more rapidly, if Woodburn and Hubbard are to realize the purpose of purchasing a fast pursuit plane, Hubbard, and a medium bomber, Woodburn.

Russian War Relief Contributions to Be Sent North

WOODBURN — Material for the Russian relief drive is being delivered to the Woodburn library, which is the central depot for contributions from Hubbard, Mt. Angel, Monitor and Gervais. Most of the clothing is already packed in heavy cardboard cartons. Workers from the Woodburn Womens clubs will pack the coats, comforters and clothing that has been brought in unwrapped.

The Woodburn Truck line is furnishing transportation to the Russian Relief headquarters in Portland. As the goods must be ready by Wednesday of next week it is important that prospective donors have their gifts at the Woodburn library by Saturday.

The drive is headed in Hubbard by Mrs. Ora Morris, in Mt. Angel, by Mrs. Osburn; in Gervais, by Mrs. Marion Henning, and in Monitor, by Mrs. Harry Nelson.

At the central depot in Portland everything will be sorted and baled for shipment by boat across the North Pacific to Russian territory. The need is urgent and time is short.
