Polio Chief Coming Here Next Week

Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, will arrive in Salem on July 5 in the course of an intensive tour of national foundation chapters in 12 western and northwestern states.

Reviewing the progress made in the fight against infantile paralysis and discussing the work being done nationally and locally, Mr. O'Connor will meet with the heads of the army service commands and naval districts, chapter officials and personnel, members of the women's division, motion picture theaters, radio executives, sports editors and many others who volunteered during the national foundation's recent annual appeal. Meetings in Oregon are scheduled for Salem and Portland.

Among those with whom Mr. O'Connor will confer are Gov. Earl Snell, Ruth Williams, regional director of the national foundation, Portland, Mrs. David Wright, Dorothy Cornelius, Rex Kimmell, Al Lightner, of the Marion county chapter and campaign chairman from communities in the county. Chapter officials from western Oregon counties are invited guests.

During his stay in Salem he will have a press interview at 11 a.m. at the Senator hotel. At 12 o'clock he will speak at a luncheon in the marine room, Hotel Marion, and at 2 p.m. he will interview interested individuals and chapter members at the Senator hotel.

Blood Donors Slow to Sign

One hundred registrants short for next Tuesday's operation of the mobile blood donor unit, Red Cross workers and Salem Cherrians are working today to build the list of those who will take a small portion of their Fourth of July holiday to give blood for United States fighting men on world battlefronts.

"Neither the nurses and doctor who comprise the blood donor unit will take a day off from their tasks to celebrate our independence," Milton L. Meyers, Marion county Red Cross blood donor chairman, pointed out Friday night.

Third of Aged Now Receive \$40 a Month

More than one-third of the beneficiaries of old age assistance grants in Oregon are now receiving the full amount of \$40 a month. Gov. Earl Snell announced here Saturday. In June, 1942, the average was \$33.01.

For June, this year, the average state grant was \$33.32. Medical assistance is supplemented at 40 per cent on the state level \$17.60. The over-all grant is \$50.92.

Multnomah county old age assistance grants have been slightly higher than the state average. In June, 1944, the average grant in Multnomah county was \$35.18, plus the medical assistance which added \$2.09, making the average \$37.27, or \$2.19 more than the average state grant. For June, 1942, the average grant in Multnomah county was only \$35.33.

Being supplemented, the average of medical aid supplies also to those who are receiving the \$40 maximum. Medical supplementation comes from general assistance. Snell said state and county public welfare commissions endeavor to provide individuals in similar circumstances similar treatment throughout the state in compliance with state-wide uniform standards of assistance.

The direct property tax load, however, has been less, Snell declared. The two and one-half million dollar general fund appropriation was eliminated, and in addition, the state is now assuming 90 per cent of the general assistance load, thereby providing tax relief to the counties. The prior ratio was on a 60-40 basis.

The state public welfare commission and the county public welfare commissions are now engaged in reviews of all old age assistance grants with a view of bringing the grants into conformity with the present standards of assistance.

Oregon May Enter Suit Over Taxing

F. H. Young, Portland, manager of the Oregon business and tax research, suggested to Gov. Earl Snell and Attorney General George Neuner here Friday that the state of Oregon intervene on the side of the government in the suit testing the validity of the Oklahoma community property law.

The Oregon community property law, approved at the 1943 legislative session, was copied largely from the Oklahoma act. Under the Oklahoma and Oregon laws a man and wife may make separate federal income tax returns.

The government is protesting the Oklahoma law on the ground that it would deprive the federal government of a large amount of income tax.

The Oklahoma law was upheld by the United States tax court at Washington, DC, and later by the district court of appeals at Denver, Colo.

The case is now on appeal to the United States supreme court. The Oregon community property law is optional, while in California and some other states it is mandatory.

Draft Office Will Be Moved

State selective service headquarters, now in the state office building, will be transferred to the former Salvation Army USO building in downtown Salem in about a week, Elmer V. Wooton, state selective service director, announced here Friday.

The offices now occupied by the selective service department will be used by the staff of Col. Ray F. Olson, who becomes acting adjutant general of Oregon Saturday.

Col. Olson succeeds Col. Wooton as acting adjutant general.
