Apple Talk

Green Fruit Appears on Home Trees

Life should be well worth living again; for apples are hanging on the trees, and soon they will be almost an everyday menu member.

This week we had our first green apple pie—from the very earliest of trees in the neighborhood and although it may have been rushing the season a bit, for the apples were certainly tart, they tasted perfectly grand in a pie.

The first apples should be put down as sauce for next winter, if your family is fond of applesauce. No other fruits have the same flavor as early green apples, and although we have this fruit practically all the year around, fresh applesauce put in jars and waiting to be used in winter menus, is a money saver, time saver and certainly a popular food to have.

Although we in our family have never put apples in the freezer and seem to have no friends who have done it, other fruits go well in the freezer and certainly apples should. According to the government bulletin on freezing fruits and vegetables, winter apples of firm quality can be frozen. We think then surely green apples should do likewise (and green apples are firm).

According to directions, the apples should be cored and peeled and cut in eighths (ready for putting into pie). They should be dropped into a brine made with 3 tablespoons salt to 1 quart water (this is to keep them from turning dark). Mix with 1/2 cup sugar to a quart of fruit and put in freezer.

If your family says to use some for fresh applesauce, you may make it with or without sugar. If the latter is the method used, when ready to eat, warm slightly and stir in sugar to taste.

PAPRIKA VEAL

1 pound thin veal steak
Lard or drippings
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/4 cup water
Paprika Gravy

Brown veal slowly in hot fat. Add seasoning and water. Cover. Allow to simmer 30 minutes. Cover with paprika gravy and continue cooking 30 minutes or more until meat is tender. Serves 5 or 6.

PAPRIKA GRAVY

4 tablespoons drippings
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
1 teaspoon paprika
Salt and pepper
Melt drippings, add flour and blend. Gradually add milk and stir constantly until thickened. Boil 2 minutes. Add paprika to color sauce red and salt and pepper to taste.

Diminishing Funds Menaces Fish Industry in Oregon

Unless some immediate action is taken to replenish the diminishing funds of the state fish commission, either through an emergency appropriation or loan, it may be necessary to close a number of state hatcheries and otherwise menace the future of the commercial fisheries industry in Oregon.

This was stressed at a conference here Friday attended by Gov. Earl Snell, Merle Chessman, Astoria, chairman of the legislative interim fisheries committee, and a group of other persons interested in perpetuating the state's commercial fishing assets.

Figures presented at the meeting showed that by the end of July the fish commission will have a deficit of \$15,000, despite the fact that hatchery employees have been reduced from 51 to 32 and the existing 21 hatcheries are being operated for the same cost as 11 hatcheries a number of years ago. Other financial curtailments also have been made in operating costs.

The commission deficit was attributed largely to lower poundage revenues and low ceiling prices on fish which have discouraged fishermen from operating this season. This is one of the few commercial fishing states in the union where the fish commission does not employ a biologist, Chessman told Gov. Snell.

It was indicated that any funds temporarily borrowed from the state would be repaid next fall when the poundage fees were expected to increase.

As a permanent solution of the fish commission's financial problems it was suggested that its operations be restored to a legislative appropriation basis. It was estimated that \$150,000 net per year would be the minimum appropriation necessary for operations and any additional activities, such as installing screens and dams, research and future planning would require more money.

The fish commission was placed on a self sustaining basis in 1923. In event the commission is restored to an appropriation basis by the legislature its revenues would go into the general fund of the state.

It was agreed to call a meeting of the fish commission and others interested in the existing financial emergency in the near future when some definite plan will be worked out.

In the meantime the attorney general will be asked whether the state emergency board has authority to appropriate its funds for a self sustaining state activity.
