NEW YORK, June 30—(AP)—The stock market today closed the books on June with a lively recovery in low-priced utilities and specialties, a come-back of the rails and selective strength for scattered "blue chips."

Rising tendencies generally predominated after a steady opening and advances of fractions to 2 or more points were in the majority when the curtain was rung down on the session.

The Associated Press 60-stock average as of 2 at a point at 55.5. Transfers totaled 1,750,630 shares, compared with 1,889,840 the day before.

Wheat Gains, Then Loses

CHICAGO, June 30—(AP)—Wheat advanced today to new highs for the past two weeks before the milling demand for futures was satisfied and prices broke under the pressure of hedging sales and profit taking. At the close quotations were fractionally lower.

Most of the trade showed a preference to await further indications as to whether the government may undertake a purchase program to assure farmers parity prices.

At the close wheat was ¼ to ½ lower than yesterday's finish, July 1.58½-¼. Oats were unchanged to ¼ higher, July 76½. Rye was ¼ to ½ lower, July 1.06½-¼. Barley was ¼ to ½ higher, July 1.22½.

Increase in the movement of cash wheat was reported with local arrivals listed at 53 cars. No. 2 sold at a ¼ to ½ cents a bushel over the September future, slightly lower than yesterday.

Today was the first day for circulation of notices of intentions to deliver wheat on July contract but the trade expected no tenders until cash grain can be bought and shipped on a more attractive basis. In the case of rye, however, matters were different and some of the recession in prices was attributed to liquidation by longs desiring to avoid taking delivery of grain that had been tendered.

Clover Hay Baled in Hopewell Community
HOPEWELL—Ninety tons of clover hay has been baled at the Fred Kirkwood farm, with the Allison baler.

Fifty tons was purchased by Charles Sargeant and trucked to Grand Island barn.

Royal Anne Cherry Harvest to Start
HOPEWELL—Royal Anne cherry picking will start July 2 in the Peter Parvin's 100 acres in the Hopewell hills orchards. The crop, in a pre-harvest estimate, gives promise of a bumper yield. Pickers will receive three cents a pound.

OSTA Files School Aid Petitions

Completed petitions for the so-called state school support constitutional amendment were filed in the state department here Friday, by the Oregon State Teachers' association.

The petitions contain 31,706 signatures of voters as against 15,025 required by law. F. W. Farr is executive secretary of the teachers' association.

In event the petitions are found to be regular the amendment will go on the ballot at the November election.

The proposed amendment adopted would require the state to provide a fund equal to 45 cents a day of attendance in the public schools. The fund would, on the basis of 1942-43 attendance figures, equal \$12,722,976.76 compared with present state support of \$7,363,139.06.

The local school property tax offset feature of the amendment provides that \$8,000,000 shall be used for this purpose rather than the present \$5,000,000 provision of the state school support fund law.

Raising of the fund is placed outside the six per cent constitutional limitation according to provisions of the proposed amendment. The distribution of the fund is to be provided by legislative act.

The state would provide approximately 50 per cent to 60 per cent of the cost of the schools if the amendment is approved by the voters in November.

Hunger Sends Canyon City Over Bond Quota

CANYON CITY, June 30—(AP)—It was hunger that sent Canyon City over the top in the war loan drive ahead of all other Grant county communities.

George Fernand, in whose inn bond headquarters were located, decided he needed a new bond-buying incentive. He issued a new rule: No T-bone steaks would be served except upon purchase of a war bond.

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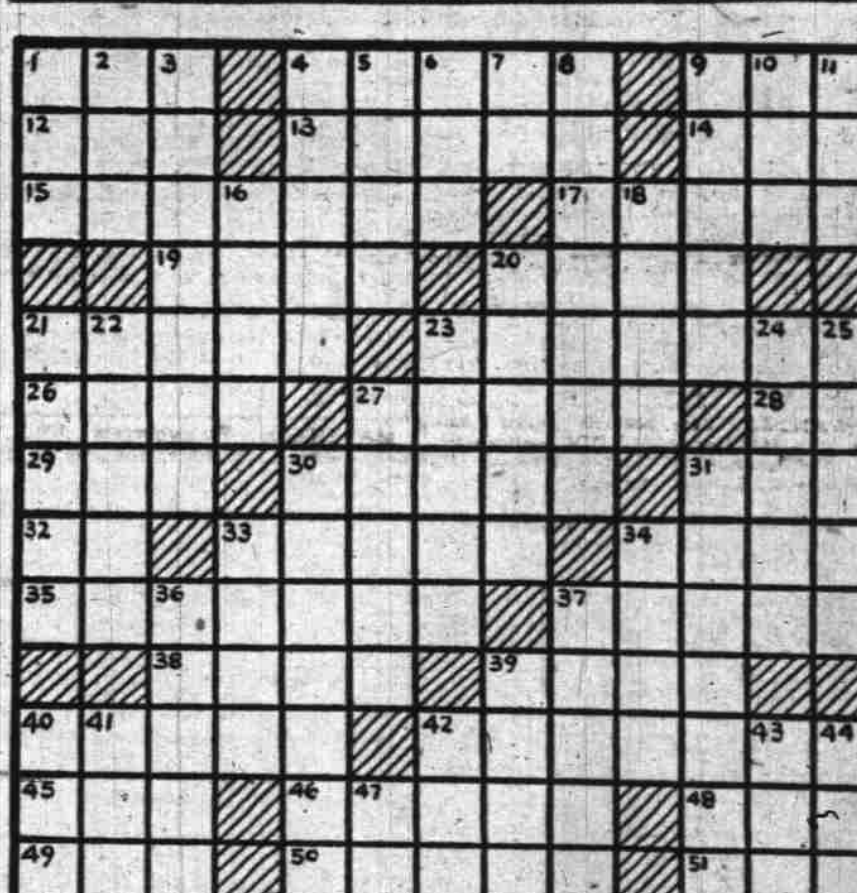
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Foremost of "Oregon" To Be Given Portland

Crossword Puzzle

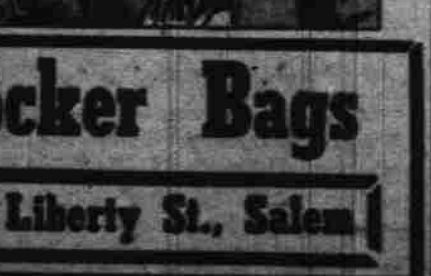
