Grain Market Irregular

CHICAGO, July 1 (AP)—Wheat futures fluctuated in an irregular market today. At the opening the undertone was easy but prices rallied at mid-session, then sagged under the pressure of profit taking and hedging sales near the close. Rye broke in early trading but there was no great pressure on the market and prices were strong in late trading. Oats were up sharply at the close. Wheat closed 1/4 higher to 1/2 lower than Friday's finish, July \$1.57 1/2. Oats were up 1/4 to 1/2 July 77 1/2. Rye was 1/2 to 1 1/2 higher, July \$1.09-1.09 1/2. Barley was up 1/4 to 1 1/2, July \$1.23 1/2. Announcement of new flour subsidies, 3 1/2 to 13 1/2 cents lower than last month, had some effect on market sentiment. The 13 1/2 cent reduction in the soft red winter wheat subsidy was larger than anticipated. Commission house and professional buying and all lot purchases for mills came into the wheat pit when prices declined and caused a rally. The market reacted quickly to the advance, however. July oats were bought by shorts and commission houses and were up sharply compared with other months. A fair demand for choice quality cash rye was reported and strengthened an otherwise quiet market.

Strawberries are particularly scarce and raspberries are not always obtainable. Only a few stawberries have been received this past week. Some growers are permitting pickers to go into the older fields and pick their own berries, charging from 8 to 12 cents a pound in the field.
