## Mother Admits Killing Her Two Children

ARMONK, N.Y., July 5.—(P)—From a hospital bed where she was taken with an acid-seared throat, a 31-year-old mother admitted today, District Attorney Elbert T. Gallagher said, that she strangled her two children in their cribs last night—one with her hands, the other with a towel.

Medical Examiner Amos O. Squire pronounced the case double murder and attempted suicide and ordered the mother, Mrs. Renee Hatch, held on murder charges. Dr. Squire said he learned she recently had been despondent.

Police identified Mrs. Hatch as the wife of Navy Lt. Aldis Brainard Hatch, now stationed in England. They also said she was the daughter of Mrs. Russell Perkins, listed in the social register.

Bodies of the children, Aldis, Jr., 16 months, and Georgette Marie, three years old, were found in their cribs by Mrs. Betty Ousteron, with whom the Hatches shared a large colonial house in this Westchester county village.

A short time later police found Mrs. Hatch unconscious in shrubbery beside the porch. They said she apparently had jumped or fallen from a porch 20 feet above the ground. She was taken to northern Westchester hospital in nearby Mount Kisco, where she was placed under guard.

## Troop 8 Will Collect Paper

Troop 8 of the Boy Scouts has been placed in charge of the waste paper salvage campaign for the Salem area this week. Collection will be conducted Saturday.

More than 6000 pounds of waste paper were collected last Saturday by Troop 11 from the Englewood district, County Director Gardner Knapp said Wednesday after compiling final tabulations.

## Judge Speaks To Rotarians

The constitution of the United States with special stress on religious freedom, racial problems and the administrative controls was the subject of a talk by Circuit Judge James W. Crawford of Portland Wednesday at the Rotary club luncheon.

Relaxation of controls after the war emergency is desired by most people who realize the probable necessity of such control at the present time, Judge Crawford said. The negro problem in Oregon will call for its best statesmanship because of the large numbers of negroes coming here in recent months with no chance for assimilation.

Judge Crawford was introduced by Justice Arthur D. Hay of the Oregon supreme court. Richard Stark sang two solos accompanied at the piano by Ruth Bedford.

## Hudson House Hit by Fire

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 5.—(P)—Flames roared through 42 rooms of a shipyard workers' dormitory early today, sending men fleeing to the street in nightclothes and seriously burning two occupants.

The injured men were Max Vignon, 40, formerly of Chicago, and F. L. Covington, 25, formerly of Poplar Grove, Ark. The blaze was discovered by two deputy sheriffs, George Dorothy and William Jones, who turned in the alarm and aroused sleeping workers.

The fire occurred in dormitory B of Hudson House. A blaze in dormitory D in November, 1942, killed seven persons and injured 40.

## Adair Keeps Up With War Through Maps

CAMP ADAIR, July 4.—The 70th division G-2 section is keeping EM and officers at division headquarters informed on the progress of the war.

A phalanx of big-scale maps in the lower hallway of division headquarters record the progress of the fighting men of the United Nations from day to day by means of the time-honored G-2 "situation map" method—a cellophane overlay with grease-pencil tracing.

Fronts shown are the Normandy, Italian, Pacific (including the China-Burma-India theatre), and Russian. A special large-scale map of Salpaia island this week showed progress of American troops battling there.

A daily series of short bulletins on each of the fronts accompanies the maps.

The maps and the daily alteration of the front-line tracings are the responsibility of S/Sgt. Louis Schram. Daily news bulletins are written and posted by M/Sgt. John Hulpieu. Both men are in G-2 section.

Castillo is charged with non-support.

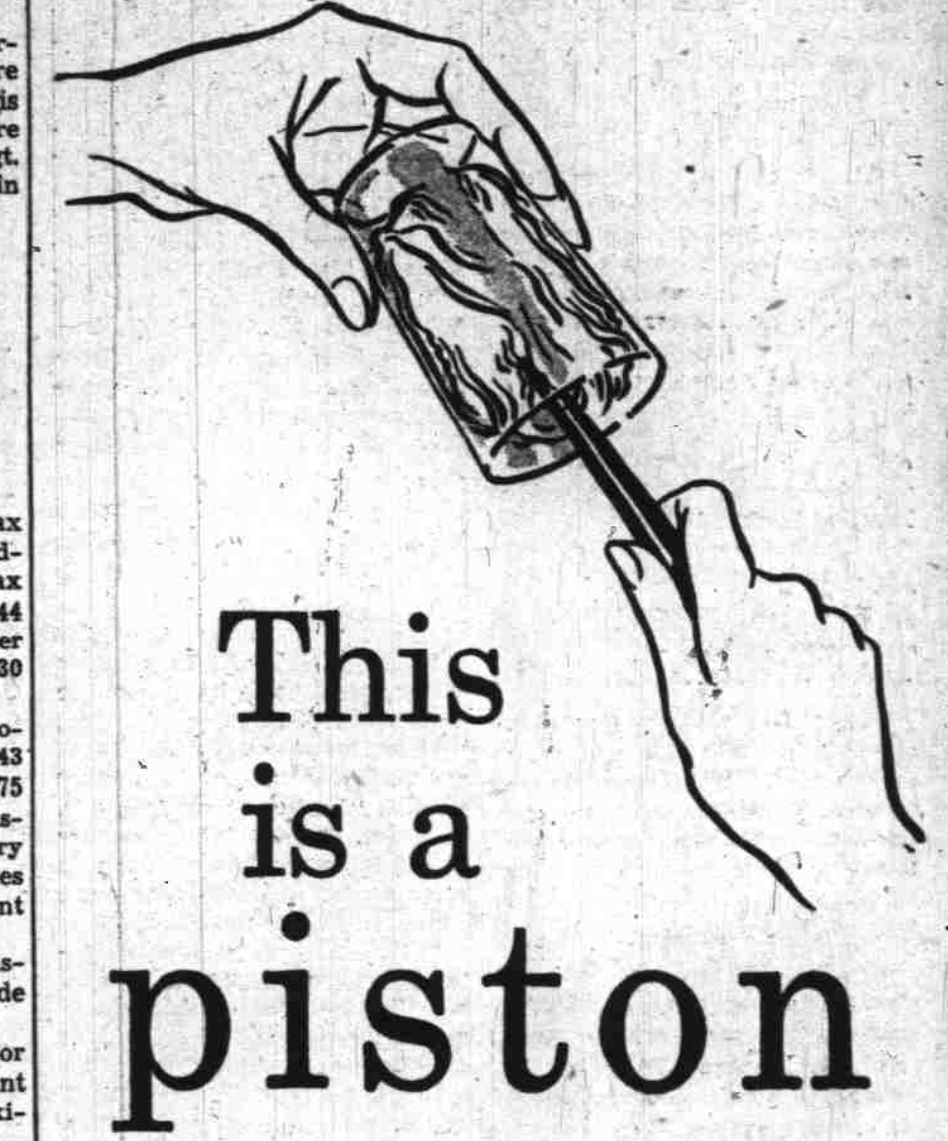
