Remember when: The report from Silverton that Lt. Col. Maynard "Heinie" Schultz has been killed in action with marines in the south Pacific will lead Northwest grid fans back to a crisp Saturday afternoon, 1933, in Multnomah stadium, Portland, and what an afternoon that was! One of the biggest ever in Northern Division football, no less, for that was the day that saw Oregon State's new immortal "Iron Men" snap at last mighty Southern California's four-year long winning streak. The late Howard Harding Jones was enjoying his most luscious years at SC then, and rabbit-like "Cotton" Warburton and Co. had amassed 27 straight victories. . . . But that day 11 Beavers played 60 minutes, from opening kickoff to final buzzer, and when they were through it was 0 for the "Iron Men" . . . "Heinie" Schultz was one of the 11 sixty-minute men, and end along with "Woody" Joslin, both having stepped up from Corvallis high. . . . Helped Lon Stiner's Coast Conference debut as head coach at OSC in that the "Iron Men" not only stopped the Trojans that season but also went east to beat Fordham and keep the Rams from a certain Rose Bowl bid. The team finally finished up in the first division in the conference race, first time an OSC eleven had done that in five years. . . . Also assisting in making it a big year for Stiner, it was the season during which he invented the "pyramid" play—Giant Tackles Ad Schwamm and Harry Fields hoisting up 6-foot 6-inch Center Clyde Devine to bat down conversion tries by the enemy. . . . The "pyramid" was quite effective, too, until ruled out, along with so many other Coast grid "tricks" which ran rampant along those years.

Night Ball Speaking for Itself—and Loudly

Of interest is the up-to-date tabulation of attendance this semester in the major leagues, as it was but a few years ago press dispatches from the east were carrying the predictions of one major club owner that "night baseball will never last." The crystal-gazing gent joins New York Yankee President Ed Barrow in the same belief, but Barrow can afford to feel thusly. What with the drawing capacity of the Yanks and the customer crop around the big town, Barrow's clan could probably play all morning games and still make money.

But what more proof could the strictly day men want than these figures? Last season the majors played before 7,714,636 in all—which includes all 16 teams in both leagues. Up to the fourth this year the turnstiles clicked off 4,241,486, over half the total 1943 figures already. And noticeable above all, the average attendance for night games this year in the big show is 13,931 per game to a 4,919 average for day games. Ratio almost three to one. Since even Ed Barrow would much rather have three than one, the prophecies don't make sense.

"Pen" Nine Wont Be Pushovers for Adair Cannoneers Club

As listed here yesterday, Camp Adair's Trailblazer division Cannoneers will hustle into town Sunday a potent baseball club studded with former professional timber, but it definitely won't find in Warden George Alexander's Prison Greys a soft touch. The Greys, to be the home or host outfit in Sunday's afternoon battle, fall to boast a single "name" player who, before OSP, gave pro pitchers many headaches. But same Greys have already proven this season to some 700 customers who saw them in action against the Air Base Pioneers in the recent war game at Waters that they have (1) a hustling club from start to go, (2) a team quite capable of coming back after being far behind (they made up

an 8-1 deficit against the Alhams to finish in a 10-inning 8-3 deadlock) and (3) an outfit which plays well together, an important item in baseball. Fans who saw the Greys go to a draw with the Air Base will attest the inmates have themselves a well-balanced team.

In fact this won't be the first meeting between the two Sunday foes. Two weeks ago Capt. Dave Garrison brought the Cannoneers up for an "inside" outing with the Greys, and they battled to a 2-2 deadlock called finally by a time limit. Neither nine pulled a punch and one was able to gather but two hits, the other three. Before that the Cannoneers played a seven-inning practice tilt with Capital post's Legion Juniors at Waters, and

despite taking it easy on the green pea kids walloped them, 16-5. Evidence of having a sharp club was given that day by the Cannoneers.

The Greys will probably counter the fast-ball slants of "Smoky" Desmond, Cannoneers ace, with Lefty Cecil Ross, he being the gent who went in against the Air Base in the third inning and pitched no-run no-hit ball for seven frames. Burly Bill Williamson will no doubt be back of the dish and in the cleanup hitting spot for the Greys. Rifle-armed Lloyd Johnson is the Greys shortstop, and from appearances in the Air Base game a good one. Johnny Hoffer, remembered as a Salem high athlete a few years ago, will likely be again at third base. Don Bal-

ley, a good hitter, will be at second and Rufus Jackson, the dusky swift who made two fantastic catches against the Alhams, will be in right field. "Blackie" Ward, who can pitch as well as handle his hit baton as if it were a toothpick, will be on first. Rubin Shank will be in left and Jack Ryan in center if the Greys open with the same lineup used against the Pioneers.

The tussle will be second of its kind for "grownups" in the town this season and tentative plans toward making it a whopping success call for Trailblazer Gen. Peter F. Rhodes to toss out the first ball, a colors guard on hand for flag-raising ceremony and all or part of the Trailblazer band in the stands throughout the afternoon.

Still more a hitter's paradise than a pitcher's, the Salem Junior baseball league, "A" division, boasts no less than 19 players swatting at a .300 or better clip. Averages compiled include fifth round games of last Sunday. High atop the heap is Dick Fleming, Funland outfielder. Fleming has been at bat eight times and has hit safely six for a gaudy .750 mark. In second place with four hits in six tries is Herb Meshely of Shrock's Motors at .667. And Herb Applington, Redwood Nurseries catcher, makes it three above the .500 mark with his four-for-seven .571 percentage.

Based on 10 or more times at bat, Chuck Patterson, catcher for the Mayflower Milkers, leads the list with .467, resulting from seven bingles in 15 tries. 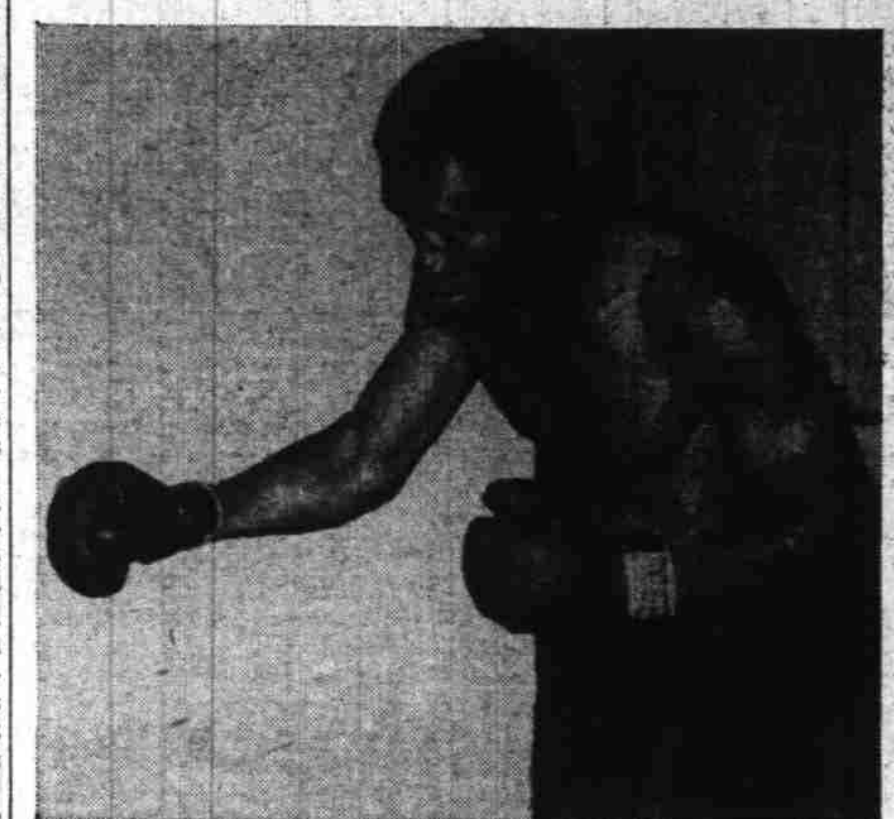
"Tiger" Fox Wins Again

Shunted to Inactive Division, Foxx' Career at Finish Line

CHICAGO, July 5—(AP)—The comeback attempt of Jimmy Foxx, home-hammering star of the Philadelphia Athletics and Boston Red Sox in the late '20's and the '30's, today was officially pronounced a failure by the Chicago Cubs, who transferred him from their active list to the status of a coach and ball pen catcher.

Foxx, 36, reported to the Cubs in the midst of spring training this year after remaining out of baseball all last season. The Cubs acquired him from the Red Sox in 1942 and he hit .205 in 70 games for them that year.

After starting a few games at third base early in the season, Foxx this year has been used merely as an infrequent pinch hitter and ball pen catcher. At bat 19 times he made but one hit, a double, for an average of .053.

Removal of Foxx' name from the active list made room on the Cub squad for Pappet "Red" Lynn, right handed pitcher who won 21 games for Los Angeles last year, who just came to terms after being a holdout since last winter.
