

3000 Bombers Pound German Installations

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—More than 3000 allied heavy bombers—the greatest number ever hurled at Europe in a single day—struck enemy installations in Germany, France and Italy from two directions today while thousands of tactical warplanes mauled German transport and supplies in a 9000 square mile triangle below the Normandy battlefield.

Thirty-two enemy planes were shot down; 14 allied planes were lost as the allies filled the skies with 6000 sorties, including five separate attacks which unloaded more than 6000 tons of explosives on the robot bomb roosts around Pas-de-Calais.

The figures on plane losses included only operations from Britain, statistics from the Mediterranean theater not being available here up to midnight.

The Germans reported the allied air raiders were pressing their two-way attacks around the coast, some bombers striking western Germany after nightfall and returning west while others swung over the upper and lower Danube and then flew south, probably back to Italian bases.

About 1000 US Fortresses and Liberators attacked the launching ramps for flying bombs and other objectives at Pas-de-Calais with 3000 tons of bombs in the most savage assault of the day—a day in which Prime Minister Churchill told the world of the thousands of casualties these robot raiders were causing in London.

ing bombs had been in progress for more than a year before the first of the missiles hit England, he said, and now, out in the open, "this battle may be a somewhat lengthy affair . . . it is yet to be tested who has suffered and will suffer the most in that process."

LAUNCHING SITES POUNDED Already, he disclosed, the allied air forces have expended 50,000 tons of bombs on the launching sites and experimental headquarters in France and Germany, and "a considerable portion of our flying power has been diverted for months from other forms of offensive activity."

When he pointed out that from day to day the fatalities caused by the bombs had averaged one for each bomb launched, members of the house exclaimed "very satisfactory!"

The prime minister, however, went on to disclose that removal of non-essential persons from London was not being discouraged and that children already were being sent from the danger areas.

But he raised and demystified a hypothetical suggestion that parliament should be moved from London, exclaiming, "here we began the war, and here we will see it end," and made it clear that the bulk of Londoners would simply have to "take" the flying bomb assaults as they did the earlier "blitz."

One point he stressed vehemently: "I do not want there to be any misunderstanding on this point, that we shall not allow the battle operations in Normandy nor the attacks we are making against special targets in Germany to suffer. They come first."

The next time you break a phonograph record, stop and ask yourself if the old music box didn't after all have something to offer.

At the statehouse coffee shop, the boys and girls have been getting a sample of juke box music of 50 years ago and they like it. When the E. V. McDermott celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary the music was provided by A. M. McDermott who took a big square golden oak box with a Regina Music Co. patent dated 1896 down to the restaurant for the occasion.

A pattern not unlike that on the reel of a player piano decks each of the great, thin, flexible copper or steel records, which for the McDermott machine range from "Nearer My God To Thee" to "Meet Me at St. Louis, Louis," indicating perhaps that the original purchaser had a taste for travel. But "Yankee Doodle Boy" is there, too, and "Will You Remember Me?"

Frankly, you don't get all the instrumental variety on the Regina we've come to expect, from today's electrical recordings, but in place of the whine which marks so many cheap records it is refreshing to hear the music box tinkle of the copper discs.

Many Have Excuses The scenes were many and varied:

"I bought my stamp last Friday," one man insisted.

"I'm sorry, but its number shows you bought it only yesterday; it'll be five dollars, please, and you may sign this."

That scene was almost routine. And there were others:

"I've had a baby and pneumonia, and just got out of the hospital," an attractive young woman pleaded.

"I'm sorry, but it will cost an extra \$5, please," came the answer, courteous but firm.

And so it went, all day long—a tiring day for Deputy Collector Paul Lynch and his harassed assistants who were trying to enforce the law as interpreted to them; a maddening day for folks whose lives weren't up to par in the first place.

There were persons who were proven wrong in their estimate of when they obtained the stamp—the stamp's figures, it probably was rightfully assumed, just don't lie.

There also were persons who said their cars were tagged, even when they bore stamps, if said stamps didn't have numbers which showed them to be purchased within the prescribed time.

Other stories circulated that federal men had gone to private garages to check up disadvantageously on the family car.

Lynch said neither of these latter policies were in line with any instructions from his office.

He indicated, too, after a conversation with the Portland collector's office, that hereafter car owners who were certain they had purchased \$5 stamps prior to the time a summons was placed on their machines could sign an affidavit to that effect and save \$5—a good start on a war bond.

That will smooth tempers somewhat today, perhaps.

The Hunan front, the high command claimed, Chinese counterattacks around Hengyang had developed satisfactorily and that the Chinese recaptured 10 enemy strong points east of the Siang river. West of it, a communique said, a point 27 miles from Hengyang was retaken. Yuhsein, enemy-held town 38 miles northeast of Hengyang, was brought under attack . . . (Continued from Page 1) Speaking in French, De Gaulle asked Mr. Roosevelt how he was feeling and the president replied he feels much better since his recent vacation in South Carolina.

There was tea on the south portico before the general left for Blair house, government-owned mansion across Pennsylvania avenue which will be his headquarters during his stay here. For De Gaulle's visit, the tri-color floated from the mansion's flagstaff.

No definite schedule has been laid down for De Gaulle's conferences with Mr. Roosevelt, Stephen Early, presidential secretary, said they would meet intermittently during the general's four-day visit.

It was indicated that De Gaulle has written off in advance any hope of obtaining American recognition of his committee as the provisional government of France. The aim, it is said, is to improve relations generally.

World Bank Draws Praise

BRETTON WOODS, NH, July 6 (AP)—The proposed international monetary fund is vital to world trade with the only alternative return to the barter system of medieval days, Lord Keynes, head of the British delegation to the United Nations monetary conference, asserted today.

"I can't see daylight on any other alternative," he told a press conference in which he said the fund would provide distressed nations with a "breather" in solving their foreign trade problems.

Lord Keynes also said he favored linking gold to currency in the fund, asserting it was "absolutely essential" that the fund make full utilization of the world's gold reserves and gold production.

His reference to gold came in reply to a question about his speech in the house of lords last May in which he said England would never return to the gold standard. He explained today that he was opposed to tying England's currency rigidly to gold and said there was strong opposition at home to any return to an inflexible standard.
