Circuit Court Makes Rulings

A Marion county circuit court jury deliberated 15 minutes Thursday afternoon and awarded a verdict to defendant Mae Ivy in the damage action brought against her by Katherine Fox, who charged that the Ivy dog had snarled and threatened attack in such a way as to cause the plaintiff to fall and injure herself.

Louis Castillo, charged with non-support, changed his plea to guilty just prior to the time set for jury trial Thursday morning and his case was continued to July 2, 1945, for sentence. Continuing the sentence, Judge E. M. Page ordered Castillo placed on probation and that he pay the parole board \$20 a week for support of his family, stay away from poolrooms and card rooms.

A jury in Judge Page's court this morning will hear the case of R. Tolliver vs. George C. Penney, appealed from justice court by the defendant in the collection action.

Court Mandate To Be Issued

Mandate of the state supreme court, upholding the conviction of Robert E. Lee Folkes, negro, under death sentence for the slaying of Martha Virginia James, on a Southern Pacific train near Albany in January, 1943, will be issued prior to July 11, Arthur S. Benson, court clerk, announced here Thursday.

Folkes was convicted of first-degree murder in the Linn county circuit court and the decree was affirmed recently by the state supreme court. A petition for rehearing of the case would stay temporarily issuance of the mandate. Attorneys for Folkes already have indicated that they will seek appeal of the case to the United States supreme court. It would first be necessary to obtain a certificate of probable cause from the supreme court here.

Following issuance of the mandate Folkes will be returned to Linn county for resentencing. He has been in the state penitentiary here since his conviction.

County Road Oiling Starts

The greatest road oiling program in Marion county since the beginning of the war, still more than 50 per cent below the peacetime normal, is in progress today.

Twenty-four railroad cars of road oil will be used by 20 workmen during the next two months, County Engineer N. C. Hubbs declared Thursday. Approximately 20 per cent above last summer's purchases, the oil will again be used only for road repairs and reconditioning.

Eastern Oregon Grass Fire Under Control

PENDLETON, July 6.—(P)—Volunteers kept a close check today on the grass and grain fire that has blackened 20,000 acres of range land in the last four days.

The blaze, believed halted yesterday, flared up again under brisk winds last night and for a time endangered acreages of ripened grain. Fire fighters said today they thought the flames were completely under control.

Ranchers estimated grain losses of about 3000 acres, with reports still incomplete. Most of the burned area is range land.

Cheese Laws Made Strict

The state of California, under a new law, requires that all cheese sold to the California retail trade shall be pasteurized or manufactured from cream, milk or skim milk which has been pasteurized, O. K. Beals, chief of the division of foods and dairies, Oregon state agricultural department, announced here Thursday.

Only exception to the California rule is that cheese which has been allowed to ripen or cure for at least 60 days from date of manufacture may be sold without being pasteurized.

Cheese made from pasteurized products must be so labeled and cheese sold in that state must be labeled also to indicate variety, grade, factory number, state of origin and date of manufacture.

In normal times virtually all of Oregon's surplus cheese is sold on the San Francisco and Los Angeles markets.

Last year Oregon sold nearly nine and one-third million pounds of cheddar cheese on the two principal California markets.

Raspberries Free From Leaf Roller

GRESHAM, July 6.—(P)—Raspberries fields, infested last year by a small variety of leaf roller which ravaged some 500 tons of the record breaking crop, seem free from the insect this season.

S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agent, credited heavy spraying in the early spring with destroying the insect.
