

Vandenberg Confident Of GOP Win

ALBANY, N.Y., July 6—(AP)—Arriving for a conference with Gov. Thomas E. Dewey on domestic and foreign policy issues, Sen. Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan predicted tonight the republicans would obtain more than 300 electoral votes in the November election.

A total of 286 votes is necessary for election of a presidential ticket.

Vandenberg, who is chairman of the senate's republican conference and one of the authors of the party's Mackinac statement on foreign policy, said he thought he and the republican presidential nominee were in "entire agreement" on foreign affairs.

Declining to specify which states he thought the republicans would carry, Vandenberg said he believed he had been "conservative" in estimating the ticket headed by Dewey and including Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio as the vice presidential candidate would be victorious by a substantial margin in the November balloting.

"The situation in the middle west, which I know something about, is excellent from a standpoint of the ticket," Vandenberg said. "Gov. Dewey's acceptance speech was particularly effective in our area—everybody liked it."

Vandenberg said he had no plans for the campaign except that he hoped to make a radio speech from Detroit next month on the Mackinac foreign policy declaration, the platform's treatment of the same subject and Dewey's public statements along that line.

He and Lt. Kent M. Cushman, 3821 South L street, Tacoma, Wash., were the only two of his six torpedo pilots to return to our carrier that night. The others eventually were reported safe. Sterrie said Japanese fighters "worked us over from the time we started in until we got out."

Lt. Barclay Gives Report On Invasion

Lt. Paul Spencer, son of G. L. Spencer, 15 Lansing avenue, formerly of Silverton, is at home on leave after participating in more than 50 bombing missions over Italy. Speaking enthusiastically of the planes he and his fellow air corps members used there, he addressed the Salem Lions club briefly Thursday noon.

Men in the air corps when not assigned to flights have comparative freedom to travel, he explained, telling how he had visited Naples, had seen Vesuvius erupt and had enjoyed a week's stay on the Isle of Capri, where he read Lloyd Douglas's "The Robe." It was particularly interesting, he declared, because he could look from the window of his room toward the hills and the vineyards and the palace grounds, not greatly changed in 2000 years.

Admonishing his parents not to worry, Lt. Charles (Scotty) A. Barclay, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Barclay, 40 Garden road, his written home from France a few of the details of how his outfit arrived in France before noon of June 6.

"We had a little excitement landing but no one was hurt, I am really enjoying the whole thing. I will be able to tell you about everything later on. The only danger we have is from planes but so far we have had so many of ours around they have not dared come near."

"The news as we hear it seems to be quite accurate. Our situation is very good and we are definitely here to stay"

"Have you heard of anyone else from Salem who was in on the fun? I came in on the first day, June 6, before noon and it was pretty hot about that time. From then on it has been very easy. There are thousands of soldiers here now so we are sitting pretty. The French people are very glad to see us and the French I learned in school comes in very handy We have French money that they gave us in England We have had no mail for two weeks so we will have a lot waiting on us. It will be here day after tomorrow"

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"We are eating well and often and the weather is very nice so sleeping in my little tent is very nice. I am still handling the messages. We have a nice large radio along with us which is playing now."

"It is light until 11 o'clock and daylight again at about 5. From where we are and with what we have the war isn't going to last long I am glad that it (the invasion) is over. . . . Send me some clipping about it all. Above all, don't worry."

Barclay, who attended Salem high school and University of Oregon, worked at Bishop's before entering the army in February of 1942. He was commissioned at Fort Monmouth, N.J., in 1943, went to England in March of that year and is now a first lieutenant, and as his letter indicates, a communications officer.
