

Clay Pomeroy Is New Pastor

Will Be Presented to Congregation at Sunday Service

The morning service at the First Christian church Sunday will feature the presentation of Rev. Clay J. Pomeroy to the congregation as the new associate minister. He will serve with Rev. Dudley Strain as a co-worker in carrying out the expanding program of the local church. Mr. Pomeroy is a graduate of Colorado college, where he received his AB degree, and also of Northwest Christian college in Eugene, where he graduated in June with the BTh degree. He was ordained to the ministry by the First Christian church of Eugene.

Rev. and Mrs. Pomeroy arrived in Salem last week and are living in an apartment at 1082 Oak street.

The sermon in the morning will be "A Lesson From History" and at night the topic is "Do We Know the Answers?" Rev. Strain will preach at both services, and an added feature will be "Religion in the News," presented by Rev. Pomeroy. Some current matter of interest to Christian people will be presented in brief, informative manner.

Ten young people from the church have been attending the annual summer young people's conference at Turner during the past week. During the following week a Pioneer camp for young people of junior high age, will be held at Turner also, and a number of representatives from the local church will attend this camp. A boys' camp, sponsored by the Ninety and Nine Men's Brotherhood of the state, will convene at Turner, with sessions for both young and older boys.

Dr. Irwin A. Fox returned from the Southern Oregon Baptist Bible conference last Tuesday and will be in his pulpit next Sunday at the First Baptist church.
