His chief interest was his presidency of the Masonic corporation. He also had an interest in the Longview Fiber company, and was president of the Alexander-Yawkey Lumber company at Prineville.

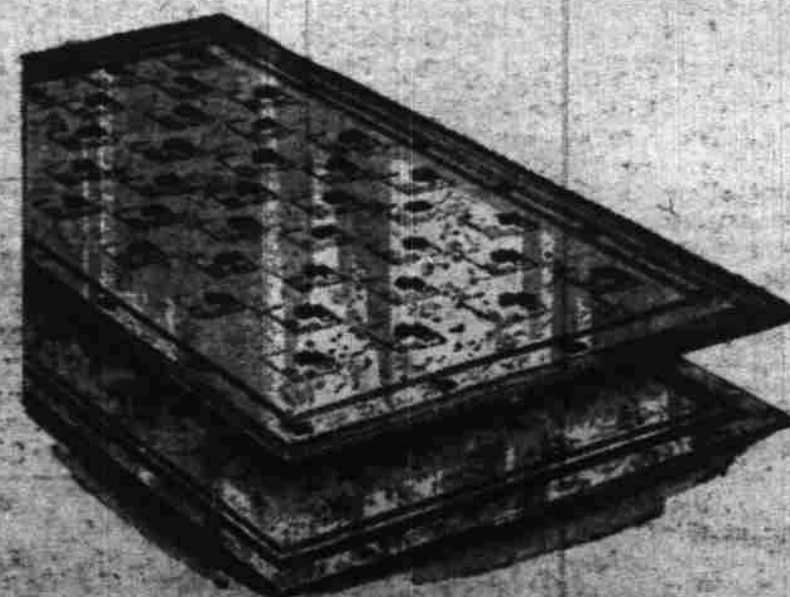
