One of Fighting Fennimores Reported Killed in Action

MT. ANGEL, July—Pfc. James Fennimore, USMC, reported killed in action in the south Pacific was the second youngest of the "seven fighting Fennimores," sons of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Fennimore. Like all his brothers, Fennimore farm at Mt. Angel, and attended the Mt. Angel schools. Like the others, he enlisted soon after Pearl Harbor.

The town was hardly aware the seven Fennimore boys were in the service until a year ago, when the American Legion publicly presented the parents with a seven-star service flag.

Jim Fennimore was born March 22, 1920. He was graduated from Mt. Angel college preparatory in June 1939 and went to Alaska to work with his brothers on a building project there. He returned home on December 22, 1941, and on December 29 left to join the marines. After he completed boot camp at San Diego, he went to the Pacific and was never home afterwards.

He went through the battle of Guadalcanal and several other major battles and sometime ago was recuperating from malaria at New Zealand. Since then, he was sent out on his last mission.

For the past year his younger brother, Pfc. Paul Fennimore shared the same division in the South Pacific.

The other Fennimores are Cpl. George Fennimore with the army engineers in the Aleutians; S/Sgt. Edmund Fennimore in the ground forces of the air corps in England; Pfc. John A. Fennimore in the infantry at Ft. Benning, Ga.; Chief Warrant Officer Earl Fennimore in the army at Camp Pickett, Va.; Pfc. Sam L. Fennimore, jr., infantry, recently from New York; and Pfc. Paul Fennimore, USMC, in South Pacific. Another brother, and the eldest, is married and lives at Scotts Mills. Three sisters also survive, Mary Holt, Breitenbush; Madeline Grosjacques, Mt. Angel; and Jeanette Fennimore at home.

Solemn requiem high mass will be celebrated at St. Mary's church Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock. Rev. Hildebrand Melchior, who has charge of keeping in touch with the hundreds of local servicemen, will be celebrant.

Pennington Funeral Held

Born on October 11, 1858, in Baltown, Mo., Francis Pennington moved with his parents to Appenose county, Iowa, when he was three years of age. In 1878 the family returned to Missouri, later making their home in Kansas and various parts of Missouri. For a time Pennington worked in a coal mine, and in 1882 crossed the plains in company with a brother, George, to Bruneau, Idaho. He spent two years on the cattle range and ten years in sheep raising and ranching. Later he went to Humboldt county, California, and spent the year 1890 in San Francisco. From there he went to Washington and later to Idaho. On April 17, 1889, he married Rhoda Loretta Black Arbuckle, in Council Valley, Idaho. She is deceased.

In the early 1900's he came to Albany, and for a time was employed by the Albany Lumber Co. In 1912 he married Mrs. Dolly Langford, who survives. Also surviving is a stepson, Harry Langford; a sister, Mrs. Hattie Smith, both of Albany, and his brother, George Pennington of Seattle.
