The canning show, sponsored by the nutrition committee for the Marion County chapter of the Red Cross, is being held at the auditorium of the Portland Gas and Coke company, South Commercial street at 1:30.

The demonstrations are free, and the nutrition committee has issued a special request for all women who are interested in the newer methods of canning—to come today and see—even the best cooks can learn many new things.

Miss Freeman will answer all questions about various canning methods, cause of spoilage, amounts of sugar, and discuss the various types of closures. Pressure cooking and how to handle the pressure cooker will also be under discussion.

tion, it was announced here today. Fish buyers would be on an allocation basis, sharing in the salmon catch in proportion to purchases over the past five years. This would virtually eliminate buyers from Seattle, Spokane and other distant points who have been sending trucks to Celilo in the last two years to buy fish for the fresh market. One result of the tentative plan might be to channel most of the fish to canneries.

GINGERBREAD 1/2 cup melted shortening, 1 1/4 cups molasses, 1 egg, beaten, 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1 1/4 teaspoons soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3/4 cup hot water. Combine shortening and molasses and add egg. Stir until well blended. Mix and sift dry ingredients and add alternately with the hot water. Bake in a well-greased 9 x 9 x 2 pan in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 45 minutes. Yields 16 portions.
