

Albie Booth Returns to Yale -- This Time as Assistant Coach

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 15 (AP)—Albie Booth, Yale's mighty mite who shot into the nation's headlines over a decade ago as an athletic hero, today joined the Blue's football coaching staff. He'll assist Howie Odell and direct the junior varsity squad.

Booth has been conspicuous by his absence from the Yale sports scene, and his return was welcomed by the university and New Haven, Albie's home town.

College football coaching won't be exactly new to the 36-year-old Booth, but 10 years have elapsed since he last had a hand in it. During the 1932 season Albie aided Dr. Mal Stevens here and in 1934, when Stevens went to NYU. Booth went along as his backfield tutor, and remained for only one campaign. Since then, Albie has been serving as a district sales manager for an ice cream company in this section and coaching a war factory's team.

For Booth, his action means a return to the scene of a meteoric athletic career which began in October, 1932, when, although the smallest player on the field, he darted through slits of daylight and upset a favored U.S. military academy eleven. Immediately the press dubbed him Yale's "Little Boy Blue" and printed the game's result as "Booth 21, Army 13."

Despite his 144 pounds and five feet, seven inches in height, Booth rode the top of the country's sports pages for the next three years as a football, basketball and baseball hero until he received his degree amid sighs of relief from Yale's athletic foes.

Henry, White Slug to Draw

HOLLYWOOD, July 15 (AP)—Henry Armstrong, Leon Angelle, and Luther "Sluggo" White, Athens, Ga., fought a draw Friday night after ten wild perpetual-motion rounds unmarred by a single clinch. Armstrong, at 136½, weighed the lightest of any of his comeback battles. White tipped the scales at 141.

Armstrong, employing his usual aggressive, rushing tactics, landed the harder blows, but White hit his man oftener. Both used hooks and uppercuts at close range to pile up their points, but neither was able to score a knockdown. Henry's best round was the seventh, in which he pincioned White on the ropes and whaled away solidly for nearly two full minutes.

Civil Air Patrol Pilots Fly 25 Million Miles

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15 (AP)—Civil air patrol pilots have flown 25,000,000 miles on anti-submarine patrol since Pearl Harbor and have sunk many underwater craft, Col. Earle L. Johnson, New York, commanding officer of the CAP, said today.

They also have saved more than 150 survivors of ship sinkings, he added. The CAP now with 94,000 fliers, hopes to enroll 250,000 cadets by January 1 as an aviation pool, Col. Johnson told an interviewer.

Free For All Futurity 1st

CHICAGO, July 15 (AP)—John March, Chicago contractor, drove convincingly toward the 1944 futurity championship today when his sleek brown colt, Free For All, cake-walked to victory in the \$51,425 Arlington futurity. The two-year-old son of Questionnaire, ably ridden by Jockey Otto Grohs, scored an amazingly easy two and a half lengths triumph over Sir Bin, owned by Don Ameche of radio and screen fame.
