

Golden Crop**Apricots Go Long Way in Flavoring Jam, Marmalade Fruit Combinations**

The way we get some fruits in this locality smacks of the predicament the shoemakers' children found themselves. We are completely surrounded by fruit trees, yet it is sometimes hard to get enough to put down for winter.

Although apricots are grown very little in this exact locality, they are grown in the state just north. Apricots are high in price, and look in the shops very much like either the first of the crop, or the very end of it.

Housewives will have to look sharp or they will miss out on the fruit. But at any rate, they will find it necessary to make a lug of apricots, or a bushel of them go as far as possible.

Fortunately, when apricots are used in preserves of jams, the strength of flavor which they have, is in their favor, because they can be combined with other fruits to go a long way in flavor. Apricots and raspberries, blackberries and apricots, apricots and pineapple, all make good jam combinations.

To make the berry combination recipes, use two pounds (about

6 cups sliced), apricots, 4½ cups sugar and 1½ cups berries. Bring slowly to a boil of desired consistency.

APRICOT PINEAPPLE JAM
5 pounds apricots
1 can pineapple (sliced or crushed) drained
1 cup nuts
10 cups sugar

Remove seeds from apricots, but not skins. Arrange fruit and sugar in shallow kettle in alternate layers. Let stand an hour then cook until thick, 20 minutes or longer. Add nuts the last few minutes of cooking. Watch jam carefully to prevent burning.

The above jam or marmalade was one of the west's most popular flavor combinations before pineapple went on the rationed list, but if your ration budget will stand it, the recipe will still prove a grand one to try.

UNUSUAL MEAT LOAF
1 pound hamburger
1 small onion
salt

1 lemon
½ cup catsup
Mix meat seasoning and onions. Put into greased pan, spread catsup, lay thin slices of lemon on top and bake in moderate oven for 1 hour or until meat is done. (The recipe sounds good and comes from a reliable source, although the writer hasn't tried it.
