Today's exciting romantic news concerns the surprise announcement of the marriage of a Salem man, Lt. William L. Phillips, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Phillips, and Lt. Mary Margaret Barker, army nurse corps, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Barker of Trinidad, Colorado, on July 6 in New Caledonia.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips received air mail letters this week telling the details of the marriage. They were married on July 4 at a civil ceremony with the mayor reading the French service.

Later the religious ceremony took place at the 69th ordnance battalion chapel on July 6 at 7:40 o'clock with Father Francis Botter, chaplain 29th general hospital, officiating. The organist played "Mother, Dear, Oh Pray For Me" and "On This Day, O Beautiful Mother" before the nuptials.

The all white chapel was lighted entirely by candles and decorated with purple bougainvillea, white lilacs and palms. Each pew was marked with a red point.

Lt. Jane DeWitt attended the bride and Lt. Roy D. Webb was best man. Ushers were Lt. Clark M. Brown and Lt. Harold P. Workman.

The bride and her attendant wore their beige army nurses' uniforms. The bride's corsage was of white roses and Lt. DeWitt's flowers were red roses and carnations.

A wedding reception was held at the 69th battalion officer's club where the newlyweds cut the four tiered cake. Bouquets of tropical flowers decorated the club rooms.

Lt. and Mrs. Phillips toured the northern part of New Caledonia on their honeymoon. They have furnished an apartment in a French house near their base.

Lt. Phillips met his bride shortly after he arrived in New Caledonia last November.

For Thirst

Fizzy Drinks Made With Carbonated Beverages: Some Special Recipes

Regular "downtown" drinks appeal to the whole family in summer time, and an occasional variation from the regulation iced tea or punch will please grownups and children alike.

You can do a lot with a bottle of soda pop and a little ice cream. Merely put the dab of ice cream in glasses and fill them up with the carbonated beverage. Root beer makes a dandy drink when used in combination with ice cream. Berry ice cream soda is concocted with the addition of strawberry soda pop to ice cream and crushed sweetened berries in a glass. Stirred up, the mixture fizzes and mixes to a good thirst quenching fountain drink.

Seasonable, certainly, is the drink recipe suggested by the Middle America Information bureau, which keeps this department familiar with unusual sounding recipes from tropical middle America. Here is the recipe that may surprise readers for its ingredients. We haven't tried it but its sounds intriguing.

HORCHATA

1½ cups cantaloupe seeds
3 cups water
¼ cup sugar
½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
Few drops pink coloring.

Wash seeds. Crush thoroughly by putting through a food chopper. Add water, sugar and cinnamon. Stir until the sugar dissolves. Cover and allow to chill in the refrigerator for at least two hours. Stir occasionally. To serve, strain through a very fine sieve or several thicknesses of cheese cloth. Color deep pink and pour over crushed ice.

Serves 4.
Fruit combinations of course are good, especially when children are among the drinkers, and several milk mixes are thirst quenchers too. Here's a beverage that takes bananas (when you can get them):

FRESH BANANA FROST
3 ripe bananas
3 scoops ice cream
2½ cups milk.
Combine ingredients. Beat with egg beater until creamy and serve at once.
