be submitted to the league officers for distribution to the lowest teams in the league standings (in order), and that if said low teams do not want the players they be handed down to the lowest team or teams in the "B" circuit.

Possible disbanding of the Capital Post American Legion Junior team was discussed inasmuch as the team draws its players from the Junior leagues. But the only action taken was the agreement that the Legion team use a pitcher only three innings at most in any game so that the pitcher will not be forced to forego mound chores with his respective Sunday league team. It was also agreed upon that the Legion team practice only on Tuesday and Friday nights of each week.

A ground rules clarification for Geo. E. Waters park was discussed and agreed upon, finally, Umpire Stanley Smith was in attendance in behalf of the off-ferased arbiters. It was decided to purchase a full set of umpiring regalia with each club in the major league to contribute an equal amount in the expense.

Possible admission charge to Sunday games at Waters park was also acted upon, but the group decided that "since it appears impractical to charge admission, it will be a league rule from now on that all kids of 'teen-age, whether they be players or spectators, occupy only the third-base bleacher seats." No youth in the "teen-age group will be allowed in the grandstand on any circumstance unless accompanied by parents. The games will be held up until umpires, coaches and managers assist, if need be, in getting the kids into the bleachers. Vandalism and needless destruction in the grandstand section of the park brought about the drastic measure, which must be obeyed. The groundskeeper at the park will be in full authority in keeping the kids in the right place, also. Only players in the current game or those who are warming up for the following game will be allowed on the playing field or benches. And those who are warming up must retire to the sections nearest the outfield fences beyond the bleachers for their practicing.
