Tuna mousse is a pretty fancy dish, but will go nicely on a summertime menu.

- Tuna mousse with cucumber sauce
- Potato chips
- Sliced tomatoes
- Peach pie

TUNA FISH MOUSSE WITH CUCUMBER SAUCE

- 1 7-ounce can tuna fish
- 1 tablespoon gelatine
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 tablespoon flour
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- Dash cayenne
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 cup finely diced celery
- 1/2 cup finely diced green pepper

Drain tuna fish and flake. Soak gelatine in cold water. Mix dry ingredients in the top of a double boiler; add egg yolks, butter, milk and vinegar and stir well. Cook over boiling water until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add gelatine; stir until dissolved. Add tuna, celery and green pepper. Pour into a 3 cup mold that has been rinsed in cold water. Chill in refrigerator until set. Unmold on crisp salad green.

- CUCUMBER SAUCE
 - 1/2 cup sour cream
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 - 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 cup diced, drained cucumber
- Season sour cream with salt and paprika. Gradually fold in lemon juice and mix with diced cucumber. Serves 8.

Watch Best Buys in Foods

According to a food bulletin issued by the war food administration, apricots "are the jackpot." It goes on to say that a bumper crop of apricots was produced this year and are coming into markets. They advise us to simply load up on apricots in every way possible.

But the bulletin was written in California.

And the apricots are a California crop. Somehow, we still think that apricots are not the fruits to put too much money into, not that we think apricots less desirable as a canned or preserved fruit, but we believe there are other and better buys among the local fruits for large quantity buying.

We still remember longingly, the few years we paid half a dollar a jug for the apricots and the grocer was glad to get rid of them at that price.

Apricots are a good eating fruit when nice and ripe. Then they go nicely in salads too.

The bulletin from the WFA also admonishes us to remember the faithful egg, and include it on frequent menus. A good way to add nutrients to a summertime meal, and stuff vitamins into the family at the same time, is to dress up deviled eggs. They can be served as luncheon main dish, afternoon snack or supper salad.

Onions, declares the bulletin, are good buys in the market, and this we know, for there are onions galore on display at local stores. Boiled onions are a good summer vegetable, and make good soup to serve at lunch time.
