

## Part-time Cannery Workers Will Be Needed in Salem

Men willing to work during vacations or spare time in Marion and Polk county canneries, as well as housewives and students available for such seasonal employment need have no fear of being "frozen" on their jobs by the "priority referral" program of the war manpower commission, it was announced Thursday by the Salem canners' committee.

Only workers employed full-time on a year-round basis are required to obtain clearance from food processors before becoming eligible for rehiring by another employer, it was stated after an interpretation of the point was secured from the local office of the United States employment service.

"This means that housewives, students, part-time workers and vacationists may work a day, six weeks or until the peak of the bean, pear, prune and peach seasons have been safely passed without being frozen to their supplementary jobs," said Dick Rentfro, personnel manager of the Reid Murdock company and chairman of the Salem canners' committee.

Rentfro stressed that there is no immediate need for cannery workers in the area, but that approximately 1200 men and 3200 women will be needed during August and September in addition to the crews already working. He urged everyone available for even one day to begin thinking about devoting some time later in the season to this vital wartime work.

"By August 15, hop picking unquestionably will drain away much manpower which otherwise might be available for cannery work," Rentfro pointed out, "and the seasonal peaks of such crops as beans, pears, prunes and peaches overlap about the time that student workers return to their classrooms in September. Therefore, all of us should be laying plans to devote as much time as possible to the processing of food crops."

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property on account of the high fire hazard caused by an excessive number of snags and inflammable debris on the ground due to logging operations and old burns, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, EARL SNELL, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-209, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 238, Oregon Laws 1941, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described area to be unlawful and that said area shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:

(a) To build no fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(b) To have as a part of his or her equipment tools suitable for extinguishing fire.

(c) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 22nd day of July, 1944, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1944.

Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 17th day of July, 1944.
