

Truman Wins Nomination On 2nd Ballot

But it was ruled out of order at that time.

Grinning and waving, Truman, the lean, gray, 60-year-old chairman of the senate war investigating committee, climbed to the speaker's platform, as soon as he won his uphill battle, to receive the convention's noisy acclaim.

Wallace Gets Support

Although Wallace's name spelled political poison to many Dixie democrats, the former secretary of agriculture commanded powerful support from some elements of labor, among them the CIO political action committee.

Its chairman, Sidney Hillman, promised the Roosevelt-Truman team "our complete and wholehearted support."

Tonight, for a second time in four years, democrats tossed a vice president onto the political scrap heap and picked a newcomer to meet with Roosevelt at the national administration.

FDR OKs Truman

Four years ago it was John Nance Garner who was dropped at the instigation of the chief executive. This year, the president had said he would vote personally for Wallace if he were a convention delegate, but that he likewise thought Truman—or Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas—would add "real strength to the ticket that will oppose the republicans" Thomas E. Dewey and John W. Bricker.

Democrats took the weak White House endorsement of Wallace as their cue. National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan, himself a Missourian, was credited by convention delegates with engineering the Truman victory.

Even James A. Farley, the old political warhorse who managed Mr. Roosevelt's first two campaigns but refused to go along for the third trip, said he was going to back the convention nominee.

His wife said a week ago that she would vote republican if Mr. Roosevelt were renominated. (Sketch of Truman on page 7)

United War Chest Fall Drive Plans Nearly Complete Here

With only two division chairmen yet unnamed, preliminary organization of the Salem United War Chest drive scheduled to open early in October is close to complete, E. Burr Miller, chairman, told his campaign committee Friday noon. The governmental and educational division has been separated. No chairmen have yet been selected for professional and West Salem.

Meeting around the luncheon table at the Golden Pheasant, the committee outlined arrangements for cooperation in publicity and coordination of work with the speaker's bureau so that there may not be duplication of programs before overlapping organizations.

Gardner Knapp is to head publicity, with Lyle Leighton, Boy Scout executive here, as co-chairman.

Frank B. Bennett, chairman of the speaker's bureau, announced that he hoped to schedule appearances of speakers from out of the city so that all interested might hear. By making early approaches to organization program chairman, he explained, it should be possible to reach each club group with a program satisfactory to the membership.

Fred S. Anusens, pre-campaign gifts chairman, said he expected to get his committee into harness three weeks before the opening of the campaign.

Other division chairmen are W. L. Phillips, automotive and transportation; R. L. Elstrom, contractors and builders; Carl Hegg, general gifts; George Alexander, governmental; Carl Aschenbrenner, educational; F. G. Leserer, mercantile; Frank Doerfler, rural; A. C. Haag, industrial; Ralph Johnson, utilities, and Dorthea Steusloff, women's division.

The campaign office was opened July 5 at the city YMCA with Blanche Allen in charge.

Flying Bomb Tempo Brings New Criticism

LONDON, July 21—(AP)—Under a day and night barrage of German flying bombs that brought renewed criticism of the government, Britons were told today the horror might get worse, but there would be a day of reckoning with the enemy.

As the missiles launched from the continent continued to kill scores, Herbert Morrison, minister of home security, soberly urged mothers and children to quit London and other danger zones.

Speaking at a luncheon meeting, he frankly acknowledged, "It is a trying attack and there is no point in making light of it."

"Let me give the parents of London a warning. Do not be influenced by a quiet night now and then, or even by a few quieter days and nights."

Rebel Officer Says Revolt Still Continues

been finally exterminated.

"It is not true that the revolt and resistance movement has collapsed."

"German officers and soldiers should stand together now and wipe out the rotten gestapo system and the Nazi clique who are leading Germany to inevitable ruin and disaster. Now is the time to act swiftly and energetically."

Speaker Cut Off

The speaker was suddenly cut off. Whether he was actually broadcasting from Frankfurt or from an underground station posing as Frankfurt was uncertain, but the Associated Press listener in London, who often has heard the Frankfurt station, said it sounded authentic. There was an anti-Nazi broadcast on the same wave-length Friday about the same time.

Failure of the plot in its initial stages appeared evident, from the repeated Nazi broadcasts throughout Friday and Friday night, and from Swiss reports that Nazi newspapers still were arriving aboard trains that were on normal schedule.

Other quarters, however, confirmed that there still was at least some life in the uprising which the Nazi broadcasts contended had been put down speedily and ruthlessly.

Normal communication between Germany and Sweden was cut for long periods, and telephone calls from Spain were refused. Barcelona reported the usual German mail and passenger plane did not arrive Friday. Swiss reports said there was unrest in the navy at Kiel and Stettin but no word of mutinies.

China Troops In Hengyang Hold Off Nips

CHUNGKING, July 21—(AP)—Japanese forces attacking Hengyang were estimated today to have risen to four divisions, perhaps 60,000 men, but the defenders held with the help of Chinese-American warplanes and one Chinese relief column was reported only a mile and a quarter from the strategic Hunan province rail city.

A high army officer said there was severe fighting both west and south of Hengyang, where Chinese units were trying to break through sieges lines and end the enemy assault, now in its 25th day. The force attacking from the south was reported closest to a junction with the garrison.

The enemy's long supply lines were bombed and shot up from the air.

Inter-bombing raged down on enemy positions south of Hengyang, blew up 11 supply dumps and damaged 70 others.

Edgar Bragg Dies Friday

Edgar E. Bragg, 77, former state accident commissioner, died Friday in a Portland hospital following a brief illness.

Survivors include the widow, Jean Bragg, Portland; daughters, Mrs. Dan McLellan and Mrs. Wallace Carson of Salem, and three grandchildren, all of Salem. Funeral services will be held here at a time to be announced later.

Born in Sullivan, Ill., he came to Oregon as a young man. He was county school superintendent of Umatilla county and later for a number of years postmaster of La Grande, coming to Salem in 1923 as one of the three industrial accident commissioners, serving in that capacity until 1931. He was then with the commission in its accident rehabilitation department in Portland and in recent years was one of the bailiffs of the US district court of Oregon in Portland.

Clough-Barrick Co. is in charge of funeral arrangements. Mr. Bragg was a member of the Episcopal church and the services will be under its auspices.

Oregon May Become Latin American Exporter

PORTLAND, July 21—(AP)—Oregon's potentialities as an exporter to Latin America were under study today by George Wythe, chief of the American republics unit in the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, The Washington, D.C., man, here conferring with Oregon industrialists, predicted a post-war boom in both exports and imports in Latin America.

To Tithe or Not to Tithe Is Question

The question which will be answered, at least in advisory form by the 1943 legislative interim committee headed by Sen. Angus Gibson, Junction City, within the next two weeks.

Under the state tithe law, 10 per cent of the revenues of a number of state self-supporting activities is turned into the general fund of the state to help defray administrative costs.

Protests against this system, voiced at the last legislative session by several department heads among them the director of agriculture and the state forester, brought about appointment of Gibson's committee to study the question.

Not only may the agencies now paying a tithe continue to pay, but other agencies may be put into the same classification and be required to pour 10 per cent of their intake into the general fund if the commission's suggestions are followed, it has been whispered from unofficial sources.

The protested petition of Mrs. Ora F. McIntyre for vacation of Eldon road, east of Salem between Sunnyview and the Garden road was taken under advisement Friday by Marion county court.

Dedicated as a road but not a county artery, the road is kept up by owners of property abutting on it, who are Mrs. McIntyre and Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Wood.

Petitioning against the closure, Mr. and Mrs. Wood and others in the neighborhood who say they use the road—a shortcut and that children take it to go to Englewood and high schools. At times, petitioners declare, parts of Sunnyview avenue are under water so that Eldon avenue is the only convenient road.

Mrs. McIntyre told the court that the large responsibility for the upkeep of the road has fallen on her and that it is used often at night by persons who park there in cars.

Koiso Named New Premier

SOUTHEAST ASIA COMMAND HEADQUARTERS, Kandy, Ceylon, July 21—(AP)—Giving no rest to beaten Japanese stragglers through the monsoon rains out of eastern India, allied raiders have struck at the enemy's staging camp at Meiring and captured great quantities of equipment. Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten's headquarters announced today.

The camp at Meiring, 26 miles south of Uthuru, was an important link in the withdrawal system by which the Japanese have been retrieving as much as possible from their disastrous foray into Manipur state the past winter.

In addition to seizing material sorely needed by the enemy, the allied raiders inflicted sharp casualties on the camp's defenders.

Henry said the northern beachhead "stretched in an arc of several thousand yards" and that the southern beachhead was "substantial."

The front line dispatch said the 17-day attack loosed 10,000 tons of explosives on Guam—battleships moved in close with their heavy guns in the final stages—and the preparation was so effective that the progress so far exceeded all expectations.

Read Adm. Richard L. Conolly, commanding the operations, said this was the smoothest of all Pacific landings to date.

Tanks were on the beaches within a few hours after the dawn landings and supplies were put ashore in great quantities.
