**Bond Issue Gets Approval**

Public utilities commissioner George H. Flagg Friday approved an order allowing the California Pacific Utilities company to issue \$1,000,000 of first mortgage bonds to refund its present outstanding bonds and to incur temporary bank indebtedness in the amount of \$225,000.

The new money, in part, will be used in the purchase of Eastern States utility properties located in Nevada, Idaho and Wyoming.

Arrangements are being completed with three large insurance concerns to acquire the bonds at not less than 105, Flagg said.

## Special Work Now Offered WAC Recruits

A new opportunity for hitherto untrained women to serve in technical capacities in army hospitals has been opened with the promise of training for such tasks at a time when the surgeon general of the army medical corps is calling for 50,000 WACs.

Because the need is so great the army has prepared to train enlistees who have had no previous technical education, Sgt. Mary Siroonian of the US army recruiting station at 211 Post office building in Salem, announced Friday.

Women specially trained as physical therapists, medical, surgical, laboratory, x-ray and dental technicians are now lending expert and skilled aid in care of the sick and the wounded in military hospitals both at home and abroad, Sgt. Siroonian says.

There are not enough such women to fill the current need, she declared, and so women between ages of 20 and 50 who meet educational and physical requirements of the women's army corps and who are interested in serving with the medical corps will be accepted to service and given the needed training.

This is valuable training for a profitable postwar career, but even more, it is helping to speed victory in a direct way, declares Sgt. Siroonian, who offers additional information to those who write or call at the Salem recruiting station.
