# **Feed Market** Remains Firm **Along Coast**

Feed markets at Portland and other West Coast terminals maintained a firm tone during the week ended July 18, according to reports to the War Food Administration. Quotations showed practically no changes as compared with the previous week with ceiling prices prevailing on those items for which maximums are in effect. The demand for feedstuffs continued good, being especially urgent for wheat millfeeds. Offerings ranged from very light for wheat feeds to fairly liberal on some of the high protein concentrates. For the country as a whole, the Index number of wholesale feedstuffs remained unchanged at 194.0 compared with 176.7 for the corresponding week last year.

Production of feed grains this season will be slightly less than last year but will be considerably more than average if July 1 prospects are realized. At the first of July, indicated production of corn, oats and barley was 109,619,000 tons compared with 112,166,000 produced in 1943. This is about 10 million tons less than the record 1942 production but is over 20 million tons more than the 10-year (1933-42) average. # Chinese Cut Off Japanese

CHUNGKING, July 22-(AP)-Chinese troops have thrown a block across the Burma road between Mangshih and Lungling, cutting off the Japanese garrison within. Encircling Lungling from the east, north and south, the Chinese high command announced tonight.

Driving toward Mangshih, which must be reduced before effective use can be made of recaptured portions of the Burma road, the Chinese occupied two more enemy positions on the Lungling-Mangshih road, forcing the enemy from strong points with heavy casualties, a communique said.
