Jefferson Resident Dies Sunday After Long Illness

JEFFERSON — Mrs. Georgia Richardson, 75, a resident of Jefferson for 27 years, died Sunday morning at an Albany hospital, following several weeks illness. She is the widow of the late Dr. W. B. Richardson, who died in 1931.

She was born at Hematite, Mo., September 16, 1868 and had lived in Spokane before coming here in 1917.

LEBANON—Three former Lebanon high school students, Howard Hughes, 1941; Lyle McCloud, 1943, and James Howard Sheppard, 1942, are among war casualties reported in the last week.

S/Sgt. Howard Hughes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Hughes of Van Nuys, Calif., was killed in action over Italy, March 19, Lebanon friends have been informed. A ball turret gunner on a B-24 Liberator, he had first been reported missing.

He completed his high school work here graduating with the class of 1941. His brother, Leonard Hughes, is now in training at Camp Hood, Texas.

Lyle McCloud, son of Mr. and Mrs. I. G. McCloud of Lacombe and a member of the 1943 class in the Lebanon high school, died of wounds received in Italy, June 22. Hospitalized for malaria, he had just rejoined his company four days before. He had been in the service since last August, was home on furlough in January and went overseas in February. He was on the Anzio beachhead.

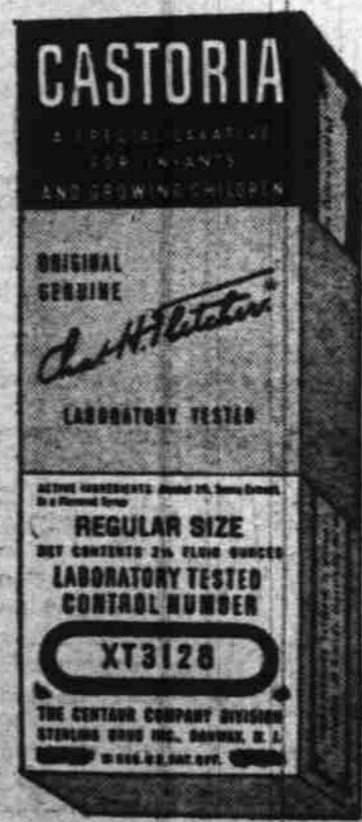
