

Basil O'Connor Takes Over As ARC Boss

WASHINGTON, July 24-(P)—Basil O'Connor strolled into American Red Cross headquarters today, took over as boss, sent three girls to Europe and then sat back to say:

"Gosh, there's a lot to learn here!"

Scurrying employees who seemed to know what they were doing were impressive and a little mysterious to President Roosevelt's former law partner, new chairman of the ARC.

"I'm going to be busy just being a student with lots of home work," O'Connor told his first press conference as successor to the late Norman H. Davis.

His first job was signing certificates to send the three workers abroad. After that it was a steady round of "here's how we've been doing this, Mr. O'Connor."

The new chairman said he would work on a full-time basis except for continuing his activities with the Warm Springs foundation in Georgia. The unexpired term to which he was appointed ends Dec. 11.

SILVERTON—Harold Mires, seaman 1/c, who visited his mother, Mrs. Josie Mires, for a few days after completing training at Farragut, left this week for a San Francisco base. He was inducted in the navy last December. He is the youngest of Mrs. Mires' four sons in the service.

GRAND ISLAND—Joe Tompkins, US marine corps, is spending part of his furlough fishing on the McKenzie river. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Morton Tompkins.

Warrant Officer Donald Scott, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Scott live in Salem, and whose wife resides in Eugene, is figuring prominently in recreational activities for servicemen in the Pacific theatre of war. Warrant Officer Scott, as director of four musical groups, gets around a good bit in New Guinea and New Britain.

He directs the "Invaders" dance band, a concert band of 32 pieces, a singing group and broadcast musical group. In a publication of the army, sent from the war area to his parents, are described some of the activity in which he and his musicians participate. "Jungle Jitters," a musical review, is now playing in 35 "forward areas" according to the paper. It began performances at the Liberty theatre in New Britain on July 4, and will play 50 performances in all. Once a week the concert band broadcasts over a local station. Musical shows play one night stands, the publication states.

Rex LeRoy Minard, electrician's mate 3/c, has been stationed at the Puget Sound naval base, Bremerton, Wash., since graduation from electrical school.

William Petersen, machinist's mate 1/c, has been transferred to Bremerton after a year's active duty in the south Pacific. Both Minard and Petersen are graduates of Salem high school and lived on route three out from Salem.

Sgt. Robert L. Snook, USMC, has been wounded in action on Saipan island in the Pacific, according to word received by his wife, Mrs. Robert L. Snook, who resides at 2605 North 24th street, Salem. No further word from the war department other than that he was wounded has been received. Snook is a graduate of Salem high school and enlisted in the marine corps two years before Pearl Harbor. His father also lives in Salem while his mother resides in Los Angeles.



Louis Widner, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Weekly, 65 Abrams avenue, who as a steward with the maritime service, was killed by the explosion at Port Chicago on July 17. Widner has seen action as a steward in the Atlantic and the Mediterranean, in the Panama canal, Australia, England and the south Pacific. He received a shrapnel wound while near India and was hospitalized for four months. He was at home on leave for a month recovering from a hand infection and left Salem July 9 for a new assignment. He met death on the Quinault Victory at Port Chicago. Louis Widner was born at Pacific City August 18, 1925, and attended Salem schools. He leaves three brothers, Byron Weekly, Salem; Ransom Widner, torpedo man with a PT squadron in the south Pacific; and Leo Widner of Portland. His grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Blomgren of Kelso, also survives.

Lyle Dingman Rites Thursday

Lyle was born in Minot, ND, October 11, 1926, and would have been 18 on his next birthday. He came to Independence in 1940 with his parents and attended the Independence school.

Survivors include the parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Dingman; three brothers, Cpl. Deraine Dingman, US army, Donald and Ardel of Independence, and two sisters, Mrs. Jesse Sohn, Jr., of Independence and Mrs. Byron Painter of Dallas. Sgt. Wilfred Dingman, the first Independence boy killed in action, was his brother.

Services will be held at the Baptist church in Independence July 27 at 2 P.M. Smith-Baum Mortuary is in charge. Rev. Jesse Baker will officiate and burial will be in Fir Crest cemetery south of Monmouth.

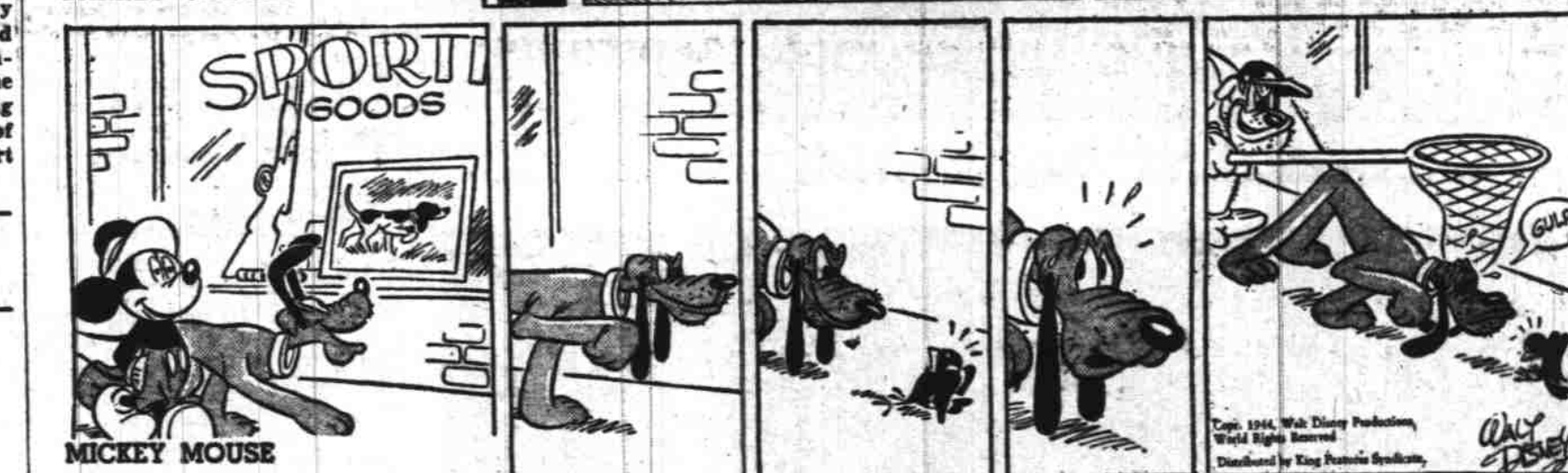
