Silverton Library Is Studied First on List of Projects

SILVERTON, July 26—Rebuilding of the Evans sawmill which was destroyed by fire last week has been started.

William Evans, manager, said Tuesday that it would be impossible to say just how quickly the mill could be replaced but work will be pushed as rapidly as possible. He hopes it will be ready for operation in two months.

The mill have have a 35,000 feet capacity, electrically operated and will employ 20 men, with an additional 15 men in the woods.
