Grass Fire Roars Across Canyon Area

THE DALLES, Ore., July 27—(AP)—Driven by a brisk wind, a grass fire roared across 10,000 acres of grassland in the Deschutes canyon area southeast of here today, and was threatening farm homes and ripening grain tonight.

H. R. Robinson, fire marshal, said the blaze started 20 miles southeast of here, and raced across 15 or more miles of the dry grasslands. An advance fireline was cut far ahead of the fire in the Haynes canyon district in the hopes it would stop the blaze. Fire fighters said if the wind dies down there is a good chance of stopping the blaze tonight.

Forest service crews were aided by farmers, harvest workers, employees of the Pacific Power and Light Co. and other volunteers. Lack of roads in the rugged canyon area made the battle more difficult.

Rogers Says State Banks Need Break

Banking in Oregon, consistently hedged round with protections for the bank client, deserves a break for the investor, Arthur A. Rogers, state superintendent of banking, told Salem Lions club Thursday noon. A bill to go before the voters this fall would remove the double liability from bank stock requirements and would add Oregon to the list of 45 states without such a penalty for the bank investor, he explained.

Today, Oregon, Minnesota and Illinois state banks retain the double liability stock feature. It was removed from federal banks in 1937.

The 40 state banks in Oregon have 10 per cent of the \$1,101,000,000 total bank assets which are under state regulation; 24 independent national banks have 12 per cent, while the two large chain banks have \$863,743,000.

One recent bit of bank legislation which brought immediate results was that which regulates automobile and small loan companies, Rogers said, declaring that there has been scarcely a complaint concerning such operations since the law went into effect, compared with an average of five a week received at state banking offices prior to its establishment. Operators of such concerns are abiding rigidly by the regulations without objection, Rogers said.

The office of state superintendent of banks in Oregon, although created by the banking law of 1907 at the request of bankers when there were 180 institutions which could be termed "banks," really was not successfully operative until 1911 when provision was made for sufficient help and expense funds so that a thorough job of examination could be done, the speaker said.

Here's How To Insure Cannery Work

The Salem cannery's committee, in a statement released Wednesday, urged that all citizens who anticipate working in the canneries during any part of the forthcoming rush period register prior to the date of desired employment.

It will be but a short time until canneries will undoubtedly need all available workers and registration makes it possible for the canneries to notify the workers as soon as the jobs open, the release stated.

It is advisable that the would-be worker register at the cannery nearest his residence. He should await call by the cannery and in the meantime watch carefully all advertisements and news releases in the local papers concerning cannery employment.

Part-time work is definitely appreciated, stated one canneryman, but it is desired that the part-time worker make arrangements with a friend to take over when his period of employment ends if that is possible.

Seven out of 10 cans will go to the armed forces or to lend-lease, is the prediction of a cannery executive. The job openings are forthcoming and the public is urged to register themselves now in order that quick service can be conducted when the rush is on.

More ASTU's Due at OSC

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, July 27—Students in the army specialized training unit here will total approximately 330 with the arrival early in August of an additional contingent of 90 for the reserve program for 17-year-olds. The new group will make necessary starting a second cycle of instruction work beginning August 7.

Previously enrolled for the first cycle are 110 students in advanced engineering and 128 in the basic reserve program. The new group of 90 will be here for two terms, college officials have been notified by the ninth service command.

Sweet Tooth To Stay Dry

SEATTLE, July 27—(AP)—There isn't much prospect of relief for the nation's sweet tooth.

Philip Gott of Chicago, president of the National Confectioners' association, reported to a candy dealers' meeting here today that chocolate allotments for civilians were cut another 10 per cent this month, with no relief in sight until the war is over. Under pressure of military needs, the chocolate supply for civilian use now is 60 per cent of the pre-war level, he said. Sugar supplies for the candy trade also are limited.

OSC Expects 10% Increase In Students

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, July 27—If early trends continue in the numbers of applications received from prospective new students there will be a light increase in entering freshmen this fall, according to figures just released by the registrar's office. While early reports are not always a reliable indication, these now show a 10 per cent upturn in applications approved for fall term entrance.

College officials predicted last spring that the low point in wartime enrollment had been reached, although they did not expect much change in the total for the fall term of 1944 compared with that of a year ago.

The college is prepared to provide excellent instruction for those students ready to start or continue their work this fall, points out E. B. Lemon, dean of administration. Students will experience less crowded laboratory and classroom conditions with adequate staffs to handle the enrollment. Housing conditions for women will be back to normal with the return of dormitories, in excellent condition, by the army.
