FAIRVIEW — Combining grain is in progress on farms here. In majority of cases the crews are running short of help. At the W. J. Marley farm, where combining started Wednesday, Mrs. Marley is sewing sacks. Mr. Marley runs the tractor and is the "oil and separator man."

Speaking before the Salem canners' committee, Baillie said that many men, presently idle but soon to be employed in construction and other work, as well as policemen, city firemen, state department personnel and service men on furlough may work either on limited statements of availability or, on a supplemental work basis, without the need of "priority referral" at all.

Urging everyone in the community, including residents of Salem, West Salem, Woodburn, Silvertown, Stayton and Liberty, to sign up now with their canneries or with the USES office for work in August, September and October, Baillie stated that all men, women and students above the age of 16 will be needed for food processing work during their vacation periods and off-hours from regular employment.

"Between August 20 and October 15 at least 1200 men and 3200 women must volunteer for cannery work to process and can fruit and vegetable crops," Baillie stressed. "We believe that patriotic women in the area will respond again with the same enthusiasm that they have displayed in other years. Of the 1200 men, however, it may be possible to recruit only about 400 more locally. That is the reason we are willing to refer men who are idle at the present time awaiting other essential work on a limited statement of availability. In doing so, we want it clearly understood that they must be released from the food processing plants when their primary employment is available."

H. A. Ketterman represented L. C. Stoll, state manpower director, at the canners' committee meeting, which also was attended by B. T. Christian, assistant state supervisor of the WMC rural industries division.

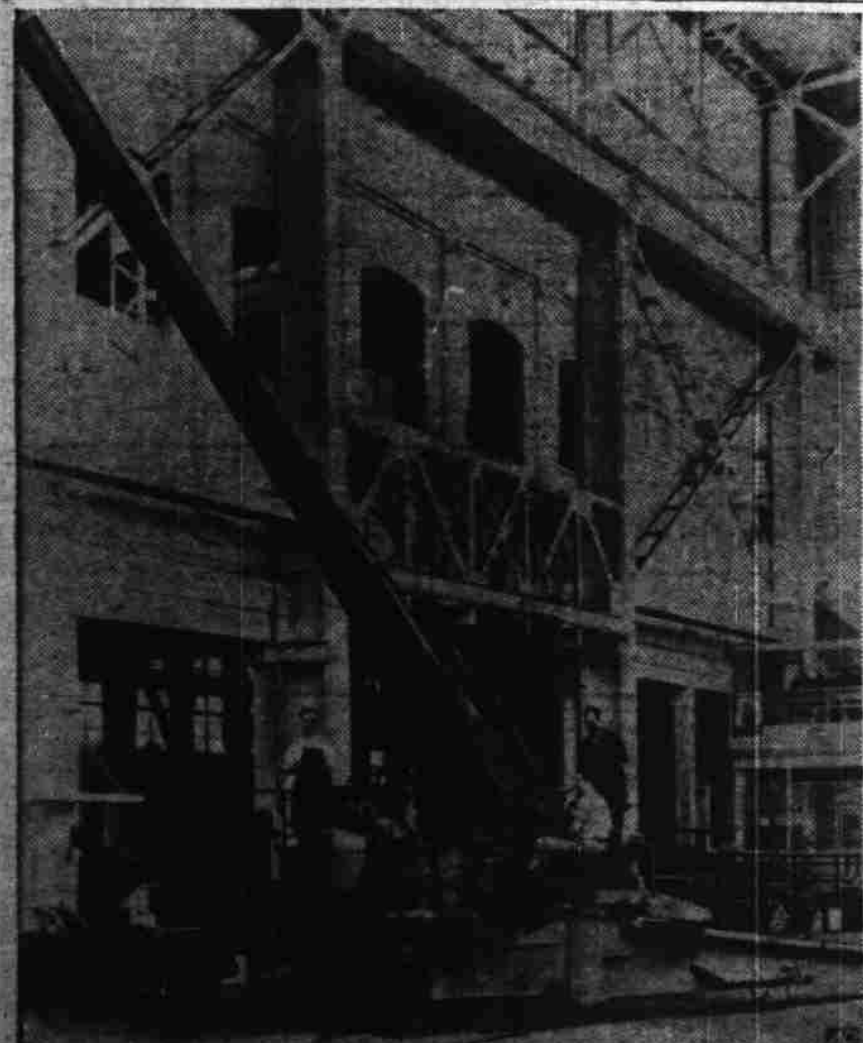

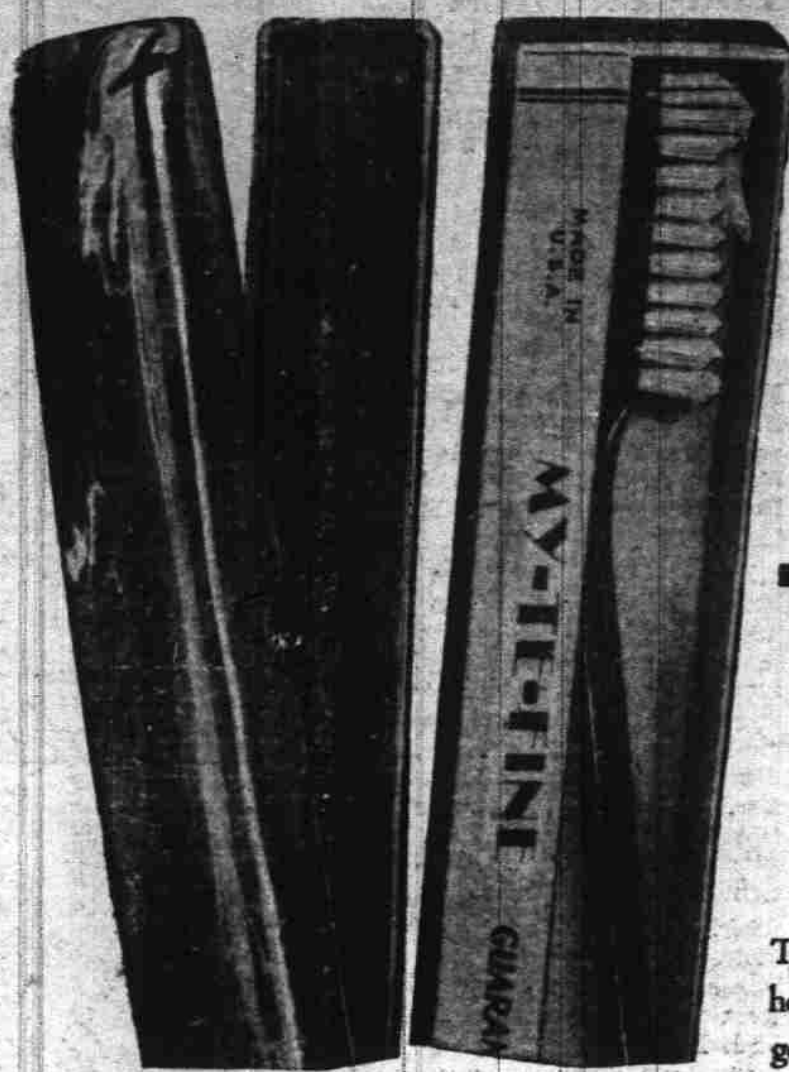
