

Calavan Rites Held Friday

Native of Albany Dies There After Brief Illness

ALBANY—Mrs. Virgil L. Calavan, 57, died at the family home Wednesday. Funeral services were held Friday, with burial in Willamette Memorial park. Mrs. Calavan had been in failing health for a number of years, although only recently she had been able to be on the street.

Born in Albany on August 4, 1886, Vida C. Nanney was the daughter of the late James B. Nanney and Edith Wrennan Nanney, early residents of Oregon. She was married to Virgil L. Calavan in Albany in 1912, and they spent their entire married life in Albany. Mrs. Calavan was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Survivors are the widower; one daughter, Mrs. Edith Crighton; her mother, Mrs. Edith Nanney, and one sister, Blanche Nanney, all of Albany, and another sister, Mrs. Lone Locke, formerly of Corvallis but now living in Honolulu.

More Workers Are Sought By Cannery

SILVERTON—Twice as many workers are needed at the Royal Canning Co. cannery, Percy Palfreyman, manager, said Friday.

Sixty five men and women are on full time at present while at least 130 are needed and there is a special need for men, Palfreyman said.

The cannery is running a day shift but would like to put on a night shift if sufficient employees can be rounded up. While only full time workers have been used so far, part time workers will be used if sufficient full time employees cannot be had.

The bean harvest is just underway at Silvertown and bean growers are reporting a shortage of pickers.

Eastman Sells To Salem Firm

SILVERTON—L. C. Eastman disposed of his interest in the Eastman Bros., Inc., he revealed Thursday, and it was understood that his brother, Austin Eastman, junior partner in the firm, was negotiating for the sale of his interest.

D. E. Cooper & Son, Salem, is the new owner. Donald Cooper, the son, will manage the Silvertown plant. Mr. Eastman has not announced his plans, other than that he will remain with the firm for a period of time as consultant on contracts already under way.

Mr. Eastman came here in 1908 and his brother joined him four years later. During his time here he has served as mayor six terms.

Silvertown Water Cut Suggested Over Weekend

SILVERTON—T. L. Blust, city water superintendent, has asked city water users to refrain from irrigating lawns and gardens over the weekend. The work on the Abiqua line is the reason for the request. Should too much water be drawn from the line, the water level in the reservoir would become so low that in case of fire danger would be great, city officials say.

They complimented the Silver Falls Timber Co. upon its cooperation in the water problem during the relocation of the water main.

Blust Resigns City Water Job

SILVERTON—T. L. Blust, city water superintendent for the past three years, has notified city officials of his resignation to take place August 1, Mayor Reber Allen admitted Friday. Mr. Blust has not given out his future plans, and the city council has not yet met to act upon the resignation.

Mr. Blust took the place of Elgin McCleary as superintendent when he resigned about three years ago to go to the Portland shipyards. Prior to that Mr. Blust was assistant superintendent for a number of years under Mr. McCleary. During the past few weeks Mr. Blust has put in a great deal of overtime because of the loss of his assistant, Leonard Strobel, who was called into army service.

City officials stated that as yet they had not engaged anyone to take Mr. Blust's place.
