In Tennis Tourney Brough, Bundy Upset Victims

SEA BRIGHT, N.J., July 28 (AP)—Two of the top ranking women players of the country were upset victims today in the fifty-sixth annual invitation tournament at the Seabright Lawn Tennis and Cricket club, in singles quarter-finals.

The first surprise for the gallery was the defeat of Miss A. Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., seeded No. 2 and second ranking player of the country, by Miss Margaret Osborne of San Francisco, who ranks fourth. Miss Osborne, holder of the national doubles crown with Miss Brough, eliminated her partner in a hard-hitting match that was fought to deuce in game after game. The score was 7-5, 12-10.

Shortly after, Miss Dorothy May Bundy of Santa Monica, Calif., daughter of a former champion and the fifth ranking player of the United States, lost to another Californian, Mrs. Virginia Kovacs, wife of Pvt. Frank Kovacs of the US army. Mrs. Kovacs out-hit Miss Bundy to win in the third set with her all-court attack, 6-2, 6-3, 6-3.

Miss Pauline Betz, the national champion from Los Angeles, and seeded No. 1, and Miss Doris Hart of Miami, advanced to the semi-finals with Miss Osborne and Mrs. Kovacs. Miss Betz, who has been beaten twice by Miss Bundy this year, defeated Miss Mary Arnold of Los Angeles, 6-2, 6-3, and Miss Hart won from Mrs. Carolyn Babcock Stark of Runson, N.J., 6-4, 6-0.
