Teacher Shortage Acute—There are 23 vacancies on the teaching staffs of Marion county schools, Mrs. Agnes C. Booth, county superintendent, said Monday. Last year at this time, she said, virtually every vacancy had been filled. With the more attractive salaries this year, her appeal to former teachers who have become homemakers to return to the profession, at least for war emergency years should bring ready response, she believes. The average salary in Marion county rural elementary schools is now \$175 a month, with a range from approximately \$160 to \$200 a month, nearly 100 per cent increase over pre-war salaries.

Mrs. Sarah Ellen Oliver, a resident of Salem since 1902, died at a local hospital early Monday morning, after an illness of five years.

She leaves three daughters, Mrs. Lola O. Furman, Salem, Mrs. Carolyn Bagley, Yreka, Calif., Mrs. Mignon Lamkin, Salem, and one son, Alfred Oliver of Corvallis. Also surviving are seven grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Mrs. Oliver was born Jan. 9, 1858, at Center Point, Gallia county, Ohio, and in 1879 married Jehu Oliver, a minister of the United Brethren church. They moved to Oregon in 1902 upon his retirement and Mr. Oliver served the Englewood church occasionally. He died in 1938.

Mrs. Oliver was local president of the WCTU for approximately 20 years, and also served several terms as county president. She was a member of the Rebekah lodge and was active in the Eastern Star and White Shrine of Jerusalem for 20 years. She served as department president of the Ladies of the GAR and was an active member of the United Brethren church.

Funeral services will be held for Mrs. Oliver from Clough-Barick chapel at 10:30 Wednesday morning.

F. L. Waters Dies Monday At Eugene

F. L. Waters, 72, former Salem theater operator, died at a Eugene hospital Monday after a short illness. Dr. Kenneth H. Waters and Stanley C. Waters of Salem are two of his four surviving sons. Other survivors are the widow, Stella Waters of Eugene; a daughter, Elizabeth Waters of Santa Fe, New Mexico; and two sons, Rodrick of Lakeview and Sgt. Howard Waters, US army air corps, Colorado.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from the Veatch-Hollingsworth mortuary in Eugene.

Mr. Waters came to Salem in 1908 and operated three motion picture houses while here, including the Ye Liberty, the Grand Opera picture house and the Wexford. He was associated with the outdoor advertising business later and sold to Foster-Kleiser and later was for many years their district manager.

A short time ago he was given a 50-year membership medal by the Odd Fellows lodge. He was also a member of the Salem Elks lodge.

Born in Champlain, N. Y., in 1872 he was a graduate of Plattsburg normal school and later taught school for several years before coming to Salem in 1908.

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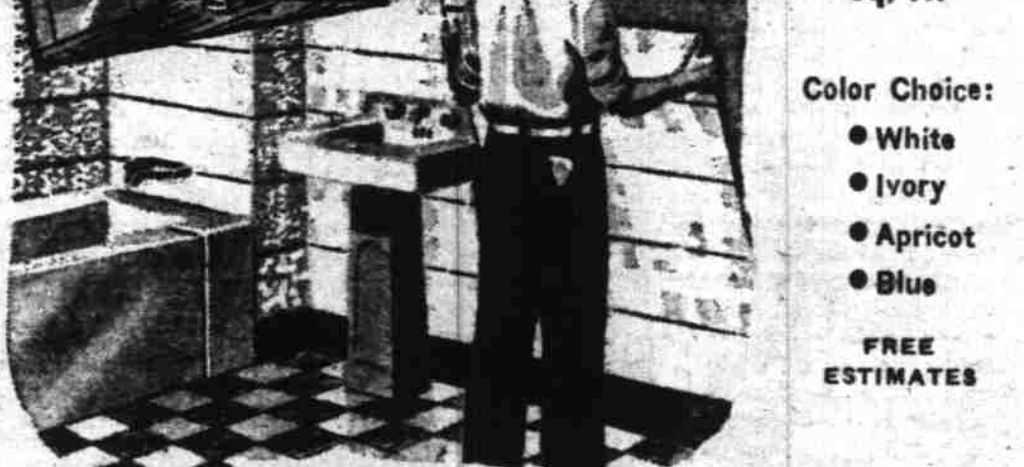
