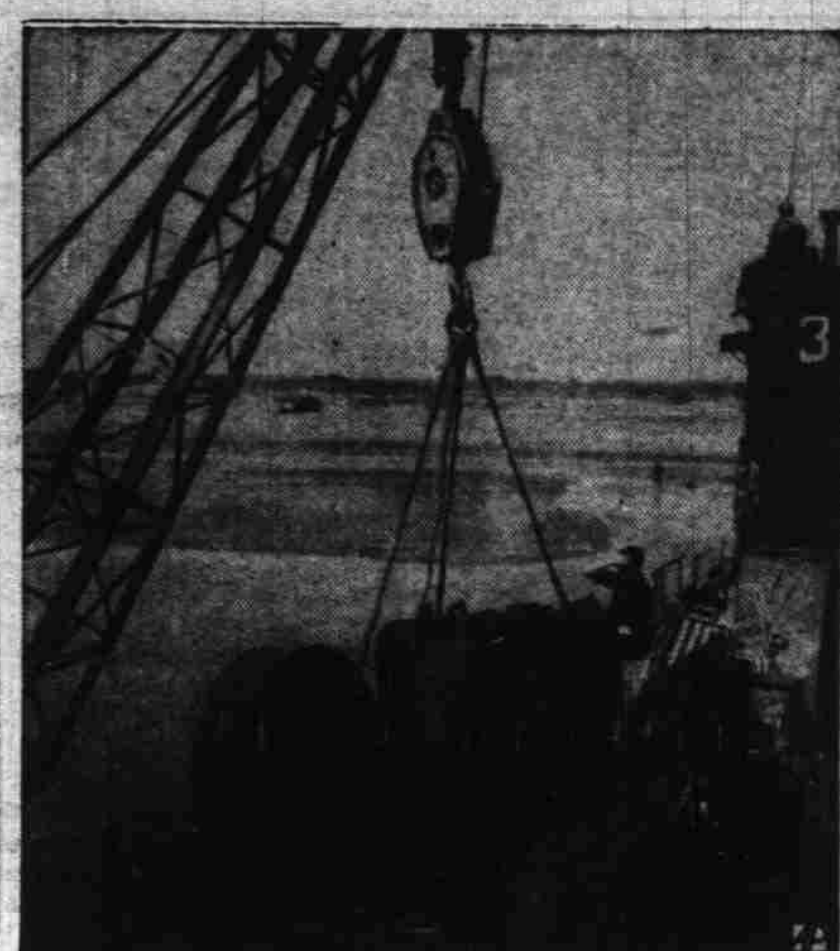
Missionary Group Plans for Picnic

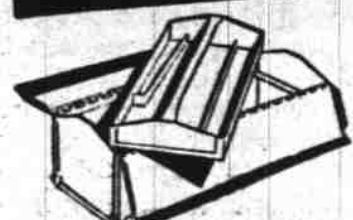
