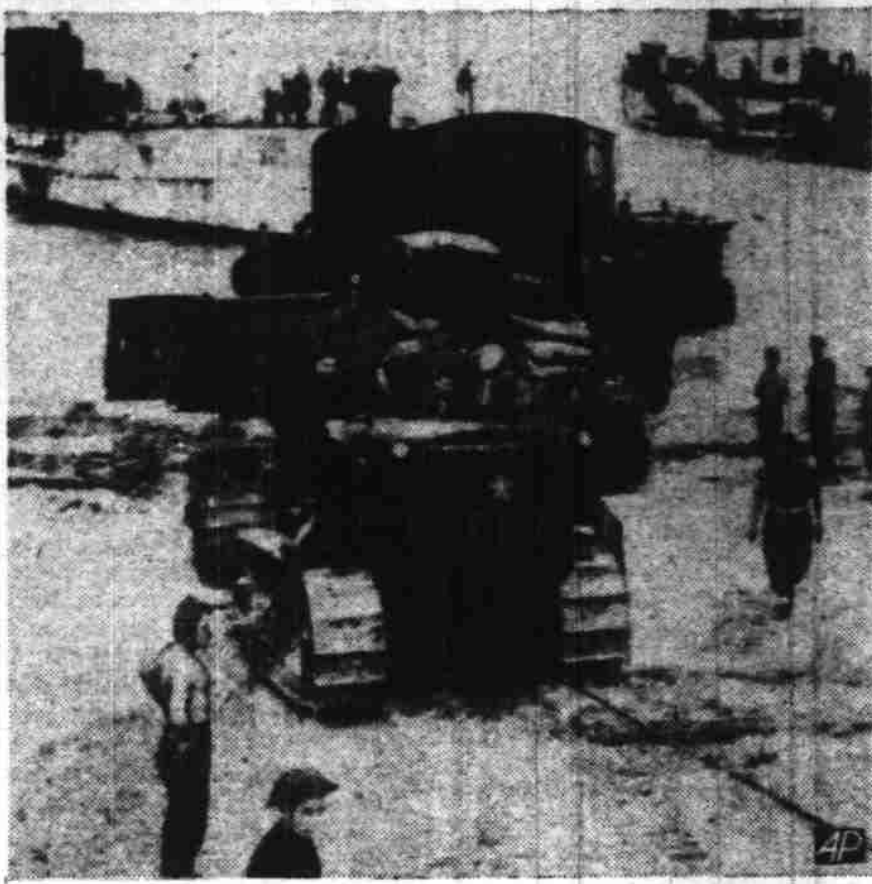
Eugene Family Visits Keizer Relatives

Silverton Tops Quota Final Figures Indicate

Adams said that this does not include the various company allotments which will bring the sum up several thousand dollars. The "E" bond sales totaled \$167,587.50.

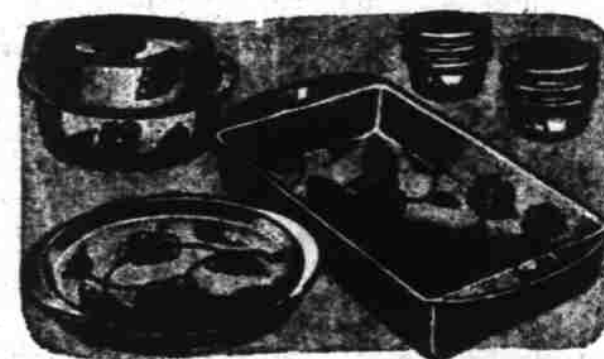
