HEADQUARTERS 13TH AAF, SOUTHWEST PACIFIC—A confirmed "kill" was chalked up by Staff Sgt. Elvin L. Barkhuff, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Barkhuff, 940 South 15th street, Salem, Ore., when 13th AAF B-24 Liberator, which he was piloting, destroyed another probably destroyed and five more damaged.

It was the first Jap plane shot down by Sgt. Barkhuff. He was operating the ball turret gun and sent a 50-round burst into a Zero approaching the B-24 from the left. Barkhuff's tracers began hitting the Zero when it was more than 700 yards away. The enemy ship burst into a straight dive. Several airmen saw it crash into the sea.

Although he has been overseas with the 13th AAF only since May 19, Barkhuff's combat career is studded with thrills. Previously his plane had shot down a Zero in the Central Pacific and on another occasion flew home from a raid on Truk with most of its tail structure shot away.

John Beskey, for many years traffic engineer for the state highway department here, was wounded in Normandy, he cabled his wife Wednesday. It is understood that he has been moved back to England. Beskey has been overseas for approximately two years.

ALBANY—Pvt. Wayne Wehrli of the 165th infantry writes his mother, Mrs. R. D. Sage of Route 4, that he was in the battle of Saipan and came through without a scratch, and is feeling fine. This was the first letter Mrs. Sage had received from her son in four months. Pvt. Wehrli mentioned in his letter that Lewis Winterstein also of Albany is in his group. He also told of a reunion with several other Albany men before he left Hawaii. In the group were Lester, Charles Campbell, Bob Kelly, and Charles Bilow. Bilow's mother is now living in Salem but was formerly an Albany resident.

PIONEER—Sgt. Eugene Imman, former Pioneer boy, home on furlough from the army hospital at San Francisco, visited Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dornbecker and family Monday. Sgt. Imman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Imman of near Dallas, was wounded in action and has spent the past two months in the army hospital. He is returning to the hospital August 1 where he will be indefinitely.

Coast Guards Review Their Proud History

The proud history of the United States coast guard is being brought into full review this week on the organization's 154th anniversary.

The coast guard is the oldest sea-going branch of the nation's armed forces. It was established by an act of congress August 4, 1790, and its name "Coast guard" was bestowed in 1915 when congress united the revenue cutter service, the original coast guard and the life-saving service.

After the beginning of the current war an executive order transferred many functions of the bureau of marine inspection and

navigation to the coast guard. Thus, the service now is composed of four agencies charged with the responsibility of maintaining safety on the high seas and along our shorelines.

Peacetime Duties

The coast guard renders assistance to distressed vessels and safeguards life and property afloat and along our thousands of miles of coastline; acts as a maritime police force, enforcing the navigation and customs law in particular; maintains beach patrol and lifeboat stations to rescue shipwrecked persons, saves property, prevents smuggling and scores of other police duties.

Maintained also by the coast guard is the international ice patrol, begun after the tragic sinking of the liner Titanic in 1912; the Bering sea patrol, and the protection of fur bearing animals, especially

the Pribilof Island fur seals.

In every war the coast guard becomes an integral part of the navy and is charged with the protection of all continental port facilities from damage due to negligence, fire or sabotage.

Much of the work of this nature now is being performed by the volunteer port security force of the coast guard, an organization including many professional and business men of our port cities.

Serve in Combat Zones

Combat duty of the coast guard sees ships and men of the service on virtually every battlefield of the world, on landing barges, supply ships, attack transports, patrol frigates, cutters and other craft. The coast guard is best known, perhaps, for its work in landing marines and army troops on the islands of the Pacific and

on the beaches of North Africa, Sicily, Italy and France.

Air-sea rescue work is another highly important job carried out by the coast guard, and convey duty is another hazardous job. The battle of the Atlantic, in which the United Nations emerged victorious, saw men and ships of the coast guard play an important part in the defeat of the Nazi U-boat raiders.

The SPARS, the women's reserve of the coast guard, are nearing their total strength of 10,000 officers and enlisted women, who are releasing men for duty at sea or at one of the many coast guard foreign stations.

The commandant of the coast guard, Vice Adm. Russell R. Waesche, now heads a complex organization of 170,000 fighting men and women whose wartime duties send them all over the world.



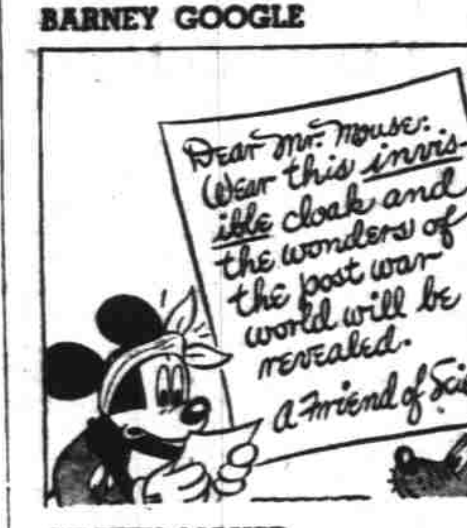
