Court Orders Vacation of 2 Roadways

Two road vacation orders approved this week by Marion county court have resulted in closures of Eldon avenue east of Salem and of Hollingsworth road in the Silver Falls area.

At the same time a new short road at Woodburn was formally established by court action.

No one appeared at the hearing Friday to voice objection to the vacation of the Silver Falls area road, requested by members of the J. M. Hollingsworth family. A request for improvement of the stretch of roadway which ended in a Hollingsworth farm field had previously been refused by the county, members of the court said.

Objections to the vacation of Eldon avenue in the McIntyre tracts east of Salem were expressed by A. E. Wood and others in writing and in person, but the court held that closure of the gravel road would be to the best interests of the traveling public.

The new road at Woodburn, already given a heavy oil paving this summer, runs 259 feet from state highway 242 (Woodburn-Mt. Angel road) to the cannery. Paved also this summer is another comparatively new county road in that area. Known as the "Wadsworth" road a thoroughfare more than 500 feet long, cutting off the corner between highways 242 and 99 and feeding into a Woodburn street, was dedicated in recent months.

ARC Supplies Yank Forces In Normandy

Word has been received in the office of Marion county chapter, American Red Cross, that US armed forces in the Normandy sector are well supplied with Red Cross services. Sixteen clubmobiles are now in operation there.

A leave club has been opened in Cherbourg with more to follow immediately. Sufficient Red Cross personnel is there to assure other Red Cross services needed by the armed forces, dispatches declare. Recreation workers are in the evacuation hospital units. Field directors have been assigned to their proper posts, and Red Cross canteen girls are busily serving troops on the beachhead with coffee and donuts from the clubmobile units.

It is anticipated, that other clubs and greater numbers of clubmobiles are to be taken there in order that the Red Cross service may be expanded to cover the enlarged war front in that section.
