Infantile paralysis is near epidemic proportions in three states and has occurred in 37 states, the US public health service said today, adding that the disease has af-fected more persons thus far this year than in any year since 1934. The total number of cases reported up to July 29, the health service said, was 3060, compared with 3180 up to the same date 10" years ago.




