Forms for Prisoners—Postal card forms to be used by relatives and friends of Americans who are prisoners of war of the Japanese have been received by Marion county chapter, American Red Cross, Judge George Duncan, home service chairman, announced Saturday. The postal card is designed to aid those writing to get the best message possible into the space requirements established by the Japanese. The card requires no postage, will facilitate censorship, save weight and space in transportation, but its use is optional, Duncan said. Thirty-six Marion county families with members held as prisoners of war of Japan and the axis are registered with the Red Cross. The cards may be obtained from chapter offices in the McGilchrist building above the Woolworth store.

Funeral services for Lynn D. Lambeth, 51, Salem automobile dealer for the past 14 years who died at a capital city hospital Saturday, will be held Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock from Clough-Barrick chapel, Salem lodge No. 4, AF & AM will conduct ritualistic services and concluding rites will be at Mt. Crest Abbey mausoleum.

Lambeth, who came to State Motors, Inc., here in 1927 as president and general manager from Portland Motor Car Co., Hudson distributors, had been ill for several months prior to his death, intermittently bedfast and hospitalized.

Born in Lacey, Mo., March 2, 1893, Lambeth came to Oregon 45 years ago. One of his early ventures in the automobile business was as owner of buses serving the Coos Bay district. He married

Mary Martin of Portland prior to the first World war, in which he served as a member of the navy.

A member of the Salem chamber of commerce, Elks, Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, Masons, Scottish Order, and the Shriners, he was also active in the Oregon Mounted Posse. Besides his widow, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Crouch, North Bend.

1800 Acre Grain Fire Causes Heavy Damage

CANYON CITY, Aug. 5—(AP)—Growers in the Monument area suffered heavy losses in the 1800 acre fire which blackened grain and pasture land before volunteer crew of ranchers and other fire fighters succeeded in controlling the flames today.

Another 2000 acre fire near Ritter still is reported to be out of control.

Sheeting Will Replace Glass In England

A large shipment of acetate sheeting to replace window glass blasted by robot bombing in London and Southern England will be shipped to Britain this week by the British War Relief society of the USA, a member agency of the National War Fund, according to information received by the Oregon War Chest.

Bertram Cruger, vice-president of the Chase National bank and chairman of the London committee of the British War Relief society, who is in New York for consultation on new emergency needs, explained that the acetate sheeting, of great tensile strength and with visibility equal to that of glass, has a high resistance to the impact of bomb blast, as proved during the blitz of 1940 and 1941, when the society furnished quantities of this material for windows.

The acetate will be cut to size in Britain, Mr. Cruger said, and will

be used in windows of hospitals, schools, children's homes, churches and other similar institutions. In Britain, he said, acetate sheeting cannot be obtained and can be obtained in the United States with great difficulty. Nevertheless, the society expects to make further shipments to Britain in the near future, according to Mr. Cruger.
