C. Friesen, recruiter-in-charge of the Salem navy recruiting substation.

Miss Titus has completed six weeks basic training at the New York WAVES school with a rating of seaman, second class. Her selection for specialized advanced instruction at the naval medical center, Bethesda, Md., was because of her special training as a nurse's aide at the Deaconess hospital. On completion of this advance hospital corps work, she will be rated a hospital apprentice and will be assigned to the naval hospital at Shoemaker, Calif.

Miss Titus graduated from the Amos Davis high school and is a member of Ideal Rebekah lodge, Surprise, grange, First Christian church and was active in school sports. A brother, Glenn R. Titus, seaman first class, is serving in the navy.

Miss Lillian Jeanne Peterson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Peterson, 1091 Sixth street, West Salem, has been selected for advance yeoman training at the WAVES yeoman school, Oklahoma A. & M. college, Stillwater, Okla., on completion of WAVES indoctrination training in New York City.

Miss Peterson completed six weeks basic training at the New York WAVES school with a rating of seaman, second class.

Selection of Miss Peterson for advanced instruction at the yeoman school was because of her experience as a stenographer at the station hospital, Camp Adair, prior to enlistment in the WAVES. On completion of this advance yeoman work, she will be rated a yeoman third class and will be assigned to a naval station.

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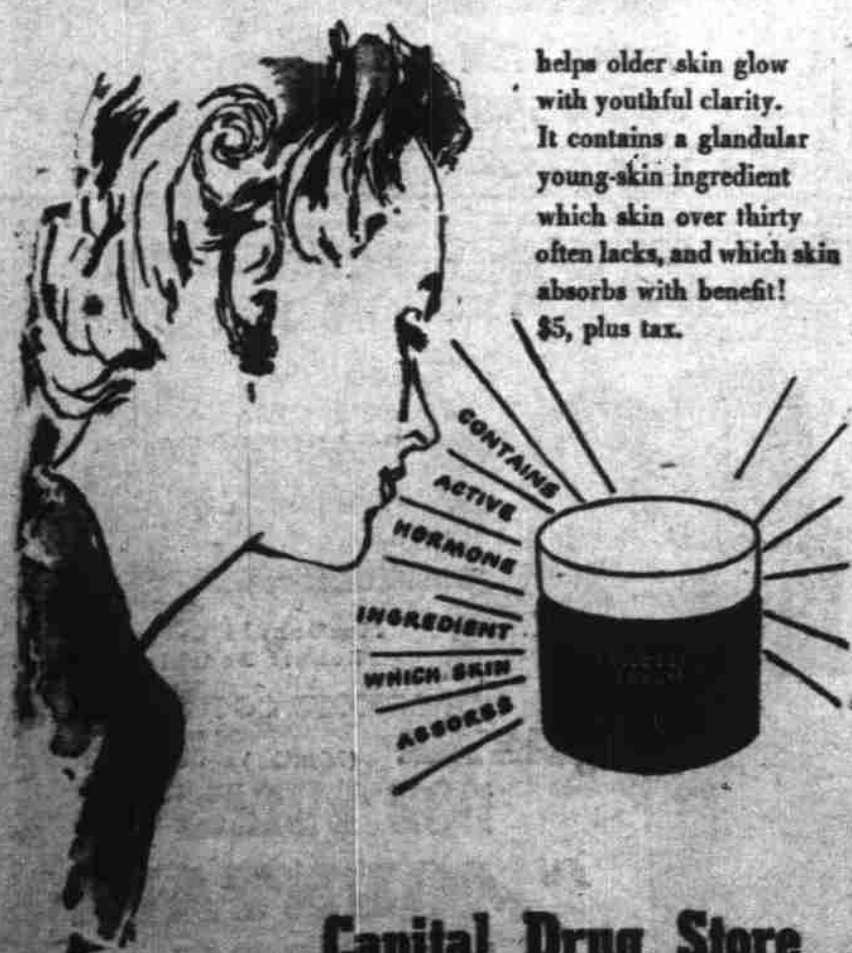
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
