WASHINGTON, Aug. 7—(P)—First Lt. Frederick J. Phillips, Agate Beach, Ore., has received the silver star for heroism under fire in Italy, the war department said today.

Lt. Phillips voluntarily left his covered position and advanced 200 yards in flat open ground through a concentration of enemy shell fire to repair communication lines which had been cut by bursting shells.

Second Lieut. William W. Wyatt, US marine corps, husband of Mrs. Anne E. Wyatt, 695 Court street, has recently returned to the states after service in the South Pacific as a navigator-bombardier and nose gunner with a medium bomber squadron.

Operating from the Treasury islands, Lt. Wyatt completed 13 missions against airfield installations and supply areas on New Britain and New Ireland. "On one mission over Kavieng, New Ireland," he says, "We dropped incendiary bombs on a seaplane anchorage area. The resultant fire made the entire area as bright as day."

He is temporarily stationed at the marine corps air depot in Miramar, Calif., pending orders to enter pilot training.

A graduate of the University of Oregon law school, Lt. Wyatt is a member of the Oregon State Bar, and prior to entering the marine corps in June, 1942, he was a special agent with the federal bureau of investigation.

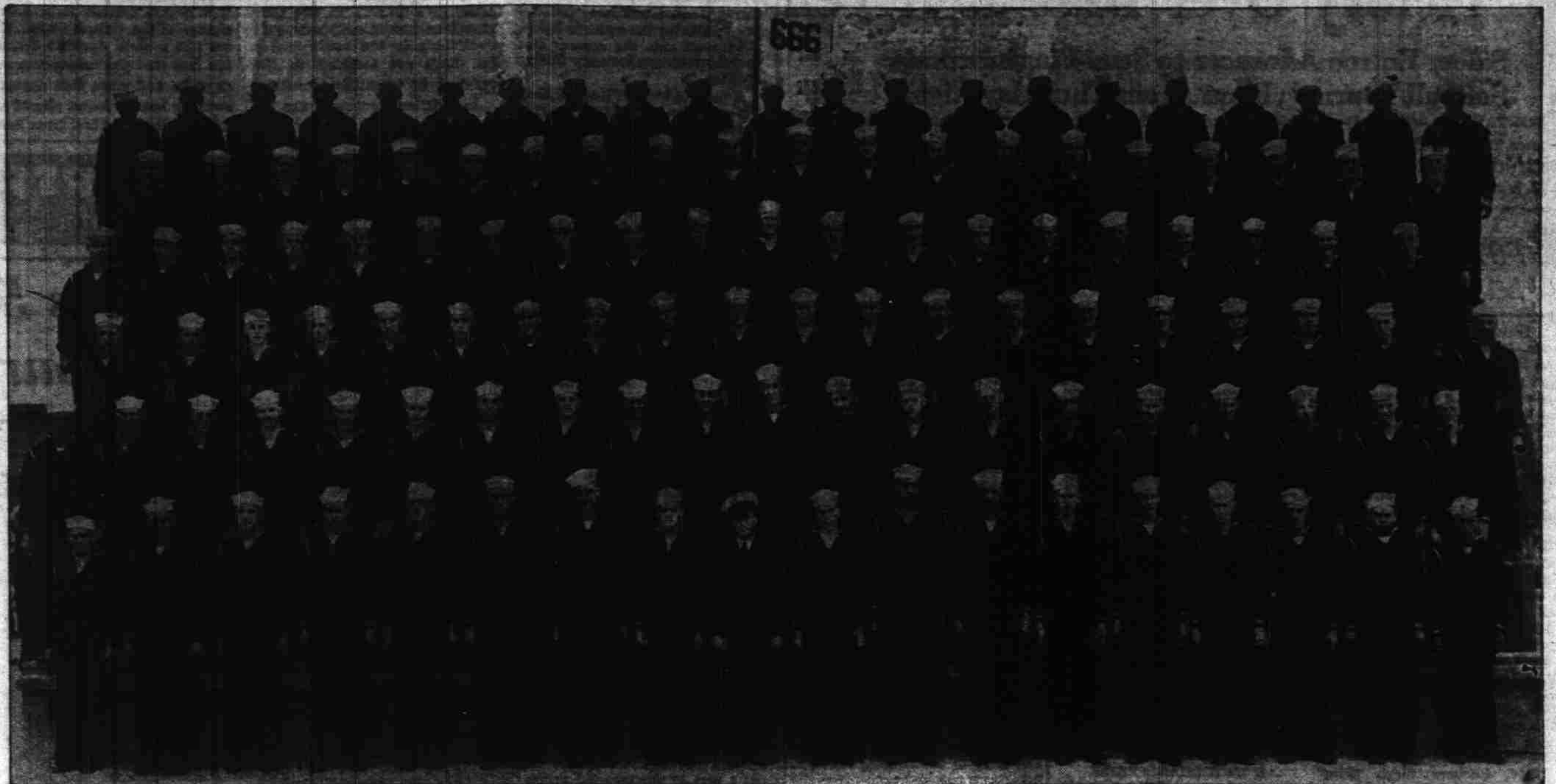
VanAlstine's wife is Mrs. Helen VanAlstine of 1975 N. Fifth street, Salem.

Soviets Capture 60 Villages In Expanding Bridgehead

LONDON, Tuesday, Aug. 8—(P)—Marshal Ivan S. Konev's first Ukraine army captured 60 localities yesterday in expanding its bridgehead west of the Vistula. These included Szydlow, 30 miles beyond the river and 25 miles southeast of Kielce, a road hub whose fall would cut important enemy communication lines linking the Warsaw and Krakow fronts.

The Russians now have seized 650 square miles on the west bank of the Vistula in a drive which has rolled southwest to within 37 miles of Krakow, last big German bastion before Silesia.

A German broadcast said the Russians still held another bridgehead, at Warka, 30 miles below Warsaw, but Moscow never has confirmed a crossing by Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's first White Russian army fighting in the Warsaw area.

Reds in North Drive
In the north, Gen. Ivan C. Bagramian's first Baltic army struck out suddenly yesterday in a twin drive toward Tilsit and Memel, key east Prussian cities. His troops captured 50 towns and villages, including Saukenal, 77 miles east of the Baltic seaport of Memel.

It was Bagramian's troops which last week plugged the land escape route of scores of thousands of Nazi troops in Estonia and Latvia by driving a wedge northward to the gulf of Riga.

In the first news of the battle progress since then Moscow radio last night broadcast an appeal by the national committee of free Germany calling on these trapped troops to surrender.

They were told that a Soviet ring "95 miles in depth" hemmed

them in, and that "a break-out toward East Prussia is impossible." "Not a single man must uselessly sacrifice his life for Hitler's lost cause," said the appeal addressed to perhaps 200,000 to 300,000 troops. The appeal was signed by Erich Weinert, committee president, and Gen. Walter B. Seydlitz, vice president. Weinert is a German refugee in Russia, and Seydlitz is one of the many German generals who have joined the committee since the Nazi debacle at Stalingrad.

Highway Cut
In eastern Latvia and southern Estonia two other Russian armies were herding these German troops westward toward Riga. The daily bulletin said the railway and highway between Madona and Gulbene, 80 miles east of Riga, had been cut in this steady advance.

Moscow did not mention the sector just opposite the East Prussian border where Gen. Ivan D. Cherniakhovsky's third White Russian army has been meeting furious resistance, but told of a new spurt toward the southern border of East Prussia by Gen. G. F. Zakharov's second White Russian army.

Zakharov's troops captured Knyazyn, 18 miles northwest of Bialystok, and Lapy, about the same distance southwest of that base. These spearheads both were about 35 miles from the German stronghold of Lomza, which must be reduced before the Russians can hit into the southern part of East Prussia and straighten their lines between that German province and Warsaw.

The Germans were estimated to be suffering losses of at least 5000 men daily in their effort to hold back the multiple Soviet armies.

Canada Has Its Own Army In Normandy

WITH THE CANADIAN FIRST ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 7—(P)—Canada, for the first time in her history, now has a separate army formation in the battlefield—the Canadian First army.

It includes powerful units of British troops, fighting under Canadian command just as Canadian soldiers have been under British command previously in this war and in World war one.

Existence of the Canadian army was disclosed today, but it actually has been operating for 10 days as a fully organized army, and many of its men have been in the line since D-day.

The Canadian commander, Lt. Gen. H. D. G. Crerar, has been in France since June 16, flying almost daily over the Canadian line. This army has confronted the best the Germans had, such units as the Adolf Hitler and Hitler youth armored divisions, and has held as many as eight German divisions at a time.

A Canadian army formation may consist of two to five corps, with two or more divisions in a corps. One Canadian corps is fighting in Italy as part of the British Eighth army.

NEW YORK—(P)—A summons containing the rare charge that an apartment superintendent furnished heat in the summer in violation of sanitary regulations—and during a hot spell at that—was issued in magistrate's court today on complaint of a tenant.

Oscar Valdes, the superintendent, told a reporter he couldn't help it. He said certain valves were broken and irreplaceable because of wartime conditions, with the result the furnace fires intended to heat the apartment's water also heated the radiator in 15 suites.

Gobs Topple Bend, 8-2

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 7—(P)—The Klamath naval air station baseball team downed the Bend civilian nine 8-2 here yesterday. The sailors earned one run and made the others on errors. Jim Olsen, former San Diego pitcher, hurled for Klamath.

Yanks Begin To Talk About Paris Leaves

WITH AMERICANS ON THE ROAD TO PARIS, Aug. 7—(P)—Punching to within 120 miles of Paris, American forces today threw the Germans back steadily here along this part of the front beyond Laval and Mayenne which, to paraphrase the generals, is a highly fluid one.

The spearheads are well beyond Mayenne and Laval on the roads to Paris but the specific mileages were undisclosed.

For the first time our troops are beginning to meet some semblance of organized resistance since the breakthrough surged across Brittany to engulf the Nazis.

Not Strong.
"But it is not opposition in strength," said Lt. Col. James O. Sewell, Washington, D.C. "We haven't hit any prepared position yet, either."

Our troops who have advanced some 115 miles in the past week are beginning to talk of leave in Paris. The daily mimeographed newspapers of one front line US division was distributed today with the headline:

"Yanks move on Paris."
Villages Captured
During the day a number of small villages were captured after a night of brisk fighting in which several enemy tanks were knocked out.

Among guns captured in this sector was an 88 with 20 rings

around its snout, indicating it claimed a bag of that many Allied planes. The gun apparently had been rushed here from some point where it had been used for anti-aircraft defense.

American troops who have been swamped with offers of cognac and calvados—which tastes and looks like raw corn whiskey—from French people, found something new. In front of a little village shop was a chalked sign, "milk bar—free."

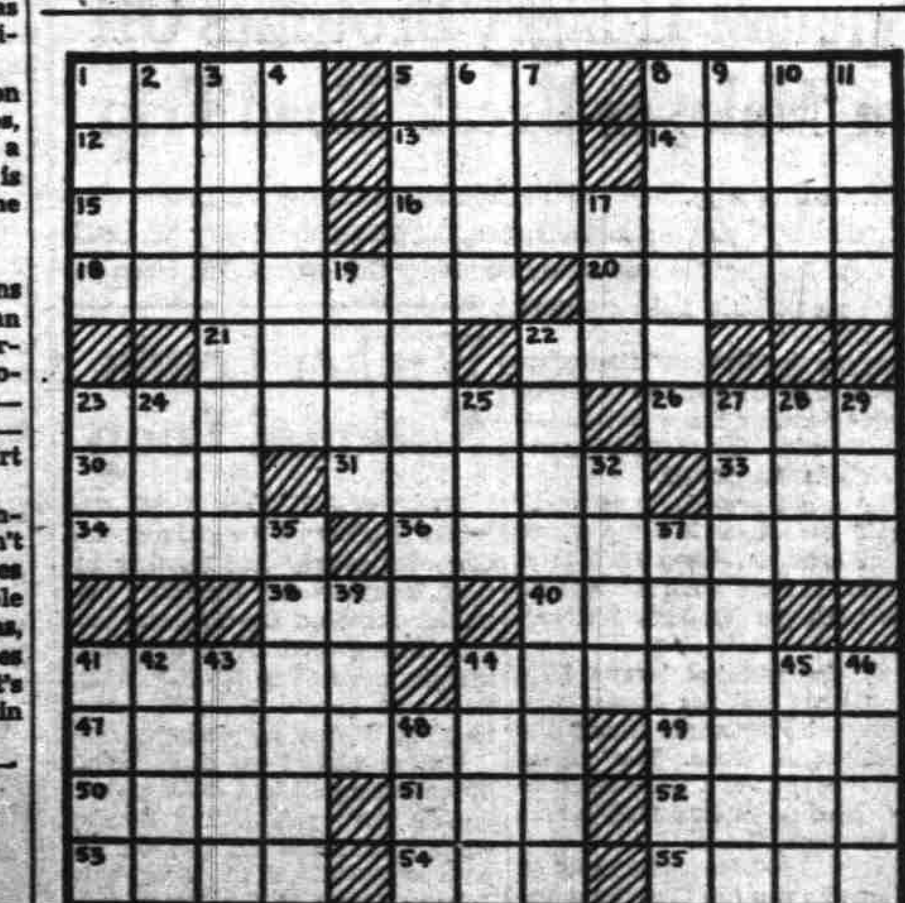
