## Education Runs 'Round Clock In Vanport School System

VANPORT CITY, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Education runs 'round the clock, summer and winter, here in the world's largest shipbuilders' city, which was tossed up in the twinkling of an eye, with room for 40,000 residents.

Sons and daughters of the men and women who have shattered ship production records in the Oregon Kaiser yards, the 454 Van Port public school students go to classes on a twoshift basis, part in the morning and the rest in the afternoon.

Toddlers from two to four years provide the rest of the 'round the clock plan by turning up at nursery school for night care if mamma happens to be swinging a crane or carrying a welder's torch on the graveyard shift.

**Special Classes**  
Grammar school children, whose sleep is disturbed by the strange working hours of their shipbuilding parents, enroll in special sleep-in-school classes.

Summer school is voluntary but the undercurrent of wartime activity hasn't passed by the small fry of Van Port and volunteers are plentiful.

To provide better care for children of working parents in this city of two-story, green-painted apartment buildings which spreads like a pale green carpet over what was once a pasture half way between downtown Portland, Ore., and Vancouver, Wash., the school system, under Superintendent James T. Hamilton has added an extended service branch.

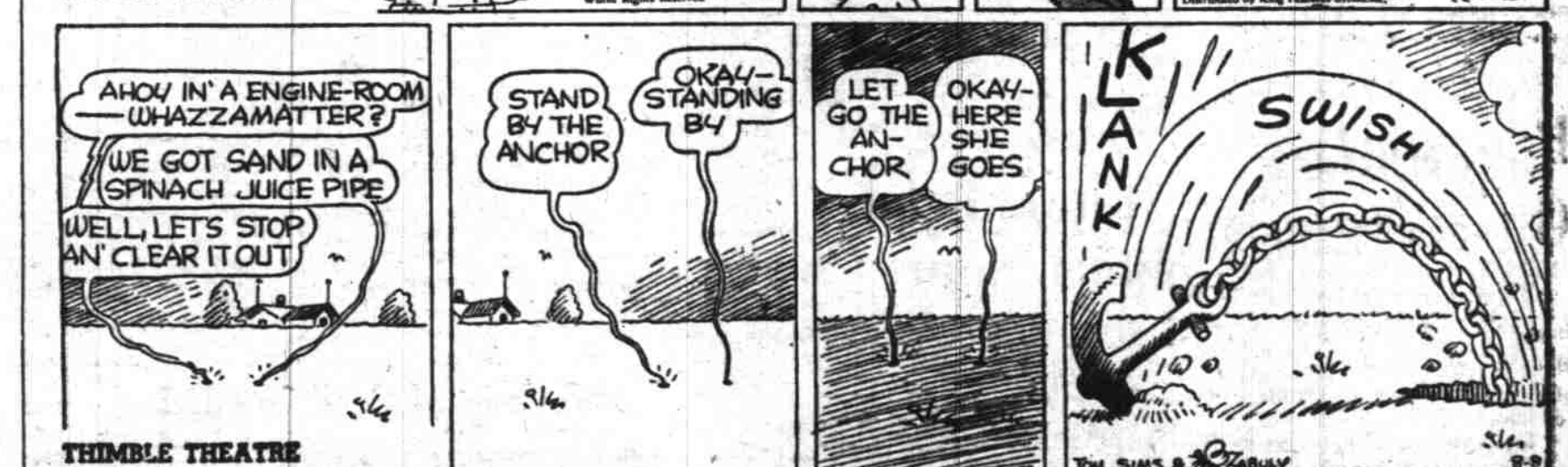
## Silverton Library Circulation 1152
