

RAF Bombers Blast Rocket Installations

LONDON, Thursday, Aug. 10 (AP)—Large formations of RAF heavy bombers battered flying bomb installations in France just before dusk last night and returned to the assault again after dark, while other squadrons of night raiders plastered other targets in occupied territory, the British announced today.

Presumably some of the night raiders operated in direct support of allied land forces battering their way toward Paris.

Yesterday wave upon wave of allied aircraft slashed viciously in a day-long attack south of Caen at a great concentration of German tanks, presumably gathered to spearhead a large-scale counter-attack, and Canadians in the sector advanced last night without meeting the armored thrust.

While the enemy armor at the vital "hinge" of the western front was being plastered, other aircraft struck at submarine pens on the west French coast and at the Nazi's patched industry and dwindling oil resources in Germany, Hungary and Yugoslavia, while still others threw a protective canopy over the whole allied front.

The enemy tanks were gathering in the Laison valley near St. Quentin de la Roche, six miles north of Falaise and just off the Caen road.

The planes presumably were led by the deadly, rocket-firing typhoon tankbusters, whose effectiveness was displayed recently in the smashing of the German counterattack in the Mortain area.

Two significant developments were disclosed by long-distance hauls yesterday by Marauders and Havocs of the Ninth air force and RAF Halifaxes to destroy fuel dumps and bridges.

Air officers said bluntly that field dumps were so badly smashed near the enemy's front he was being forced to draw from distant supplies—and that Seine river bridges were so damaged that the allies are hitting farther back at the Oise river northeast of Paris to complete the cutting of the German front from supplies and reinforcements.

Y., Aug. 9 (AP)—Leaving no doubt as to her rank as the No. 1 three-year old trotter of the year, the Kansas-owned and Kentucky-bred Yankee Maid today easily won the 19th Hambletonian as a crowd of some 15,000 welcomed the return of the harness race classic to the rural atmosphere of Good Time park.

Driven by Henry Thomas for his third buggy trip title and owned by A. L. Derby, Wichita, Kas., oilman, the bay filly took the first heat by five lengths in 2:05 and won the second by four in 2:04.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—Al Zarilla's fifth home run of the year with nobody on in the ninth inning gave the St. Louis Browns a 3-2 victory over the New York Yankees today in the opener of a four-game series witnessed by 18,074 paying customers. It was the largest week day crowd of 1944 at Yankee stadium.

Dewey Favors Strong Post War Organization for Peace

ALBANY, N.Y., Aug. 9 (AP)—Republican Presidential Nominee Thomas E. Dewey was described today by Gov. Walter E. Edge of New Jersey as favoring a strong post war organization "equipped to deal with any future threat to world peace."

Edge, a critic of the term "peace forces" in the republican platform, said he discussed the international situation at length with Dewey and found the nominee "feels that the expression 'peace forces' is all inclusive."

"It embraces everything from an editorial to a 16-inch gun and following Senator Austin's comprehensive elucidation I am sure it cannot be misunderstood," Edge said in a formal statement.

Dewey Determined

"In short, Gov. Dewey is determined that effective means shall be brought into being to assure that any future threat to the peace of the world will be promptly stamped out by international action."

Sen. Warren R. Austin of Vermont said, after conferring with Dewey here on July 11, that he and others discussed with Dewey establishment, at the earliest possible practicable date, of a "general international organization for security and peace."

"The party does not officially advocate a world government or a world army but it does stand for that degree of cooperative effort among nations necessary to prevent military aggression."

The republican platform refers to a post war cooperative organization among nations which should develop "effective cooperative means to direct peace forces to prevent or repel military aggression."

The New Jersey governor declared that the nation must have a president "who can work with congress."

"We must not again face the tragedy of a self-willed president who strives to ignore the congress and to write a personal peace plan," Edge said.

Champ Germain Rallies, Wins

CHICAGO, Aug. 9 (AP)—Uncorking a sample of her famous pressure shooting, defending champion Dorothy Germain of Philadelphia rallied to win six consecutive holes today for a 5 and 3 victory over Jean Hopkins of Cleveland and gain the quarter-final round of the women's western amateur golf tournament along with such other favorites as medalist Sally Sessions, Phyllis Otto and Betty Jean Rucker.

Miss Hopkins, who pulled a major upset yesterday in eliminating veteran Ann Casey, held a 1-up lead at the end of the first nine, only to see her advantage melt as the eastern star kindled a remarkable sub-par revival.

Miss Germain will face 20-year-old Betty Jean Rucker of Spokane, Wash., tomorrow.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. today from the Scio Baptist church, Rev. V. L. Loucks officiating, for Mrs. Callie Philippi, Willamette valley pioneer daughter, who died Tuesday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hazel D. Ashby, Oak Knoll golf course in Polk county.

Born at Scio, Feb. 28, 1863, she was the daughter of Abraham Powell and Amanda E. Powell and granddaughter of Josiah Powell, Baptist circuit rider who founded Providence Baptist church of Southeast Scio. Mrs. Philippi had been a member of the Baptist church in Scio for 50 years.

After completing Scio schools, she attended the Lebanon academy. In 1901, she was married to Stephen Philippi, sheep and livestock rancher of the Scio community. He died in 1941. Since that time she had made her home with her sister, Mrs. Iva O. Abbott, Scio, and with her daughter.

In addition to her daughter and Mrs. Abbott, she is survived by sons, Vilas J. Philippi of Roseburg and Everett D. Philippi, Central Point; two other sisters, Mrs. Lora X. Davidson, Sacramento, Calif., and Mrs. Bretta Z. Yates of Hermosa, Calif.

He said Wednesday night that the business could not function most efficiently until next spring after publication of a new telephone directory but that he expected to make arrangements meantime for proper listings so that his clients may be served.

Lumber Price Now Uniform

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—The office of price administration in a revision of its regulation covering mill prices for Douglas fir and other west coast lumber today ordered uniform prices applicable to all mills.

Previous prices had been given to mills on an individual basis. The regulation changes, effective August 14, will not alter price levels, OPA said. They include pricing of various items not included in the regulation.

Among clarifying changes is one defining use of rough weights and surfacing charges in connection with sizes surfaced on one or two edges only. Redefinitions of the terms "FOB" and "combination grades" also were made because of varying industry interpretations.

Strikers' Total Reaches Post Invasion Peak of Over 42,000

Government intervention in the strike of midwestern truck drivers and helpers was expected as the number of idle in that and other labor disputes yesterday reached a post-invasion peak of more than 42,000.

A source close to the White House indicated a solution had been agreed upon, and there was a strong hint truck lines would be taken over by the army or the office of defense transportation.

M. M. Krupinsky, chairman of the Truck Operators Association in Nebraska, one of the eight states affected by the controversy, said he understood the office of defense transportation would assume control of the truck lines in the mid-continent area today.

Operators in Kansas City, Mo., also awaited federal action.

Picketing was reported in North Platte, Fremont and Blair, Neb. V. J. Hons, district ODT manager at Omaha, asserted the tie-up of petroleum carriers threatened fuel supplies for harvest tractors and farm trucks. War labor board officials in the national capital declared they were powerless to direct the strikers to return to their jobs because the operators were ignoring a WLB order for a wage increase of seven cents an hour.

Management spokesmen maintained government agencies had failed to afford them "financial relief" to offset the proposed pay hike.

The WLB summoned leaders of the CIO United Automobile Workers union to a hearing today (Thursday) to explain continuation of a strike of 7000 employees of the Chevrolet gear and axle division in Detroit despite a regional WLB back-to-work order.

WLB Chairman William H. Davis telegraphed CIO officials: "This interruption cannot be tolerated at this critical point in the war."

Union Party Barely Wins In Quebec

MONTREAL, Quebec, Aug. 9 (AP)—The union nationale party, headed by Maurice Duplessis, 1936-1939 premier, won a bare over-all majority of one in the 91-seat Quebec legislative assembly, complete unofficial returns from yesterday's election showed tonight.

Thus French Canada, comprising almost a third of the dominion, placed before the rest of the country a firm announcement of its displeasure with the wartime regulations of Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King's liberal government at the federal capital of Ottawa.

At the same time, however, the French Canadians, with their usual independence, denounced in even more emphatic terms the ultra-nationalists and their program attacking "imperialism" and Canadian participation in "foreign wars."

The election gave the liberals 38 seats, cutting them from their former 59; gave the union nationale party 46, an increase from 15 and a majority of one; the new bloc populaire, four; deferred (Charlevoix Sanguenay), one, and others, two.

While the gutter in front of The Statesman office (and the WCTU hall) is pretty close to filled with well-twisted paper wrappings from cheaper grades of cigars, chewing gum, burned matches, one carton from which the flashlight battery is gone—ah, those look like toothpicks, so we are getting some of the Marion's clientele—and similar non-glamorous objects. Saturday night there are always a few bottles; some hardy soul usually leaves one standing (straighter than he can) on the sidewalk directly ahead of the WCTU doorway.

A few blocks down the street orange peels and peach pits are the usual streetdecoration—and all this despite Salem's ordinance forbidding us to throw ANYTHING in the streets.

A good survey like that could put enough persons to work so that there would continue to be a shortage of manpower, which equals gutters with personality, calling for surveys—and so on, ad infinitum.

Portland, Aug. 9 (AP)—A declining rate of communicable disease was reported for Oregon today by the state board of health.

The number of cases recorded last week—except for gonorrhea and infantile paralysis—was lower for every disease than during the corresponding week last year. Seven counties—Baker, Columbia, Curry, Gilliam, Jefferson, Lake and Morrow—did not report a single case.

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
