2 tablespoons flour
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup sour cream
3 tablespoons chopped parsley
Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water until tender. Brown onion, mushrooms and meat in fat. Add salt, paprika and flour

and blend. Add milk and cook until thick. Stir in cream and parsley. Add macaroni that has been drained and rinsed in cold water. Pour into greased 2 1/2 quart casserole. Mix cracker crumbs with a tablespoon melted butter and sprinkle over top. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Serves 8.
