The new proprietor will give special emphasis to the fountain and confectionery end of the business.

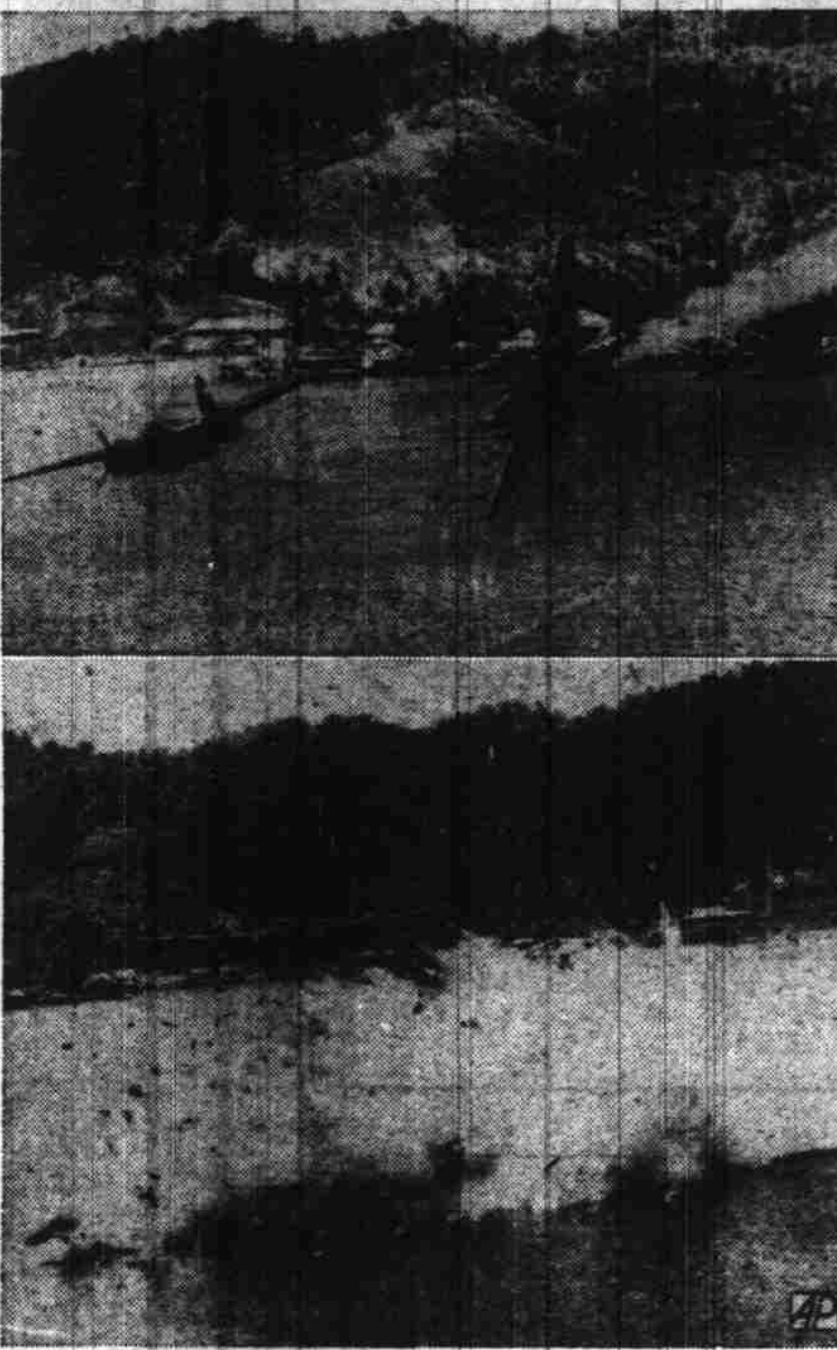
Dallas Girl Receives Pacific Scholarship
