Portland remained in a tie for fourth place by virtue of tonight's win, while the Seals slipped a notch, dropping from second to third, behind Hollywood.

The Bevos rest one full game behind the Seals, and a twin victory in tomorrow's doubleheader would shove them into third place, with a mathematical chance of going all the way to second, should Hollywood drop a pair to Seattle.

About eight years ago he was transferred to Portland, and accepted the promotion with the understanding that some day he would be back—and here he is. It's a pretty sure bet that while he was here before, he enjoyed the Santiam country often enough to strengthen the desire to come back. The Little North Fork used to be his favorite tramping place, and the tall tales of man-eating (no less) pack rats that infested the same cabins on the same weekends as he did, were enough to make a person sign the pledge. Gil claimed that once he fired a piece of stove-wood at one, and the pack-rat retrieved it for him, for a free throw. And, always the conservationist, Gil just couldn't throw again.

DUCKS & AMMUNITION LIBERALIZED  
It was good news last week when the new regulations were issued for shooting migratory game birds, and the promise that about five times as much ammunition would be available for hunters this season, as there was last year. A ten-day longer season and a bigger daily bag limit is plenty interesting to both hunters and farmers, since both will benefit. By the tenth annual inventory of migratory waterfowl, the increase in the past nine years is shown to be nearly 400 per cent among the game species. The present population, estimated, of 125-350,000 waterfowl probably is the greatest since the early 1920s. The largest increases among the ducks are those of the mallard and pintail, with perhaps 40 million of the first, and in excess of 20 million pintails. Study the official regulations, they will be off the press soon, because the bag limit rulings are a little tricky. It depends on the species in the day's bag, whether you are allowed a bonus and how large it is.
