Rye Futures Rally Strongly

CHICAGO, Aug. 14-(AP)-Rye lows for December and May contracts today, then rallied strongly on commission house buying and short-covering to close with gains of as much as 1% cents a bushel. Oats were almost as strong, but wheat, affected by early rye liquidation, made little headway.

Favorable war news, and harvesting of the big spring wheat crop in the northwest and in Canada, prompted much of the early selling.

Wheat finished 1/4 off to 1/4 up, compared with Saturday's close, September \$1.53%, after September and May had equalled the season's lows of \$1.531/a and \$1.53%, respectively. Rye was 1/8 off to 1% up, September \$1.04%-1/2, after December and May hit new lows of \$1.021/4 and \$1.03%, respectively. Oats were 1/8 to 1% higher, September 6934-78, and barley was % to % higher, September \$1.11.

The grain storage situation in Kansas City and other southwestern terminals was reported increasingly acute because of large receipts and slow movement of government owned grain from elevators. It was reported a permit system might be reinstated if the situation became more acute.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14-(P)-Quiet strength was exhibited by motors, rubbers and assorted industrials in today's stock market but steels and rails were laggards while many other leaders stumbled.

Investors again picked scattered favorites on the persistent idea that, if the European war ends soon, reconversion may not be so troublesome as some had expected and that stocks with good peacetime prospects could go places when the victory bells peal.

The junior automobile group came to life for a while after the opening but failed to get far out in front. Fractional price variations were mixed at the close with plus signs in the majority. Dealings were slack throughout.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was unchanged at 54.9. Of 844 issues registering, 365 were up, 269 down and 210 unchanged. Transfers of 687,700 shares compared with 944,330 Friday and were the smallest for a full stretch since July 31.


