Gross Sales to Determine Tax At Silverton

SILVERTON, Aug. 15.—Pinball machines, juke boxes and punchboards all come under the new ordinance effective Monday night when signed by Mayor Reber Allen and City Manager McCrea. It was passed at the special council meeting. This ordinance placed the license fee for pinball machines at \$25 a month; juke box licenses at \$10 a year and punchboard fees at six per cent of the potential gross sales with a \$1 minimum.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the sale of a 245 foot frontage on McLaine street to Harry Walker for \$700. A second resolution authorized the sale of property on Brown and Pine to Felix Wright of Stayton. The consideration in this deal was \$521. It is understood that Wright plans to put up an 80,000 egg capacity turkey hatchery on the property should he acquire it.

The councilmen also favored Manager McCrea's paying \$10 a month extra to W. M. Andres, police officer, for janitor work in the city rest rooms. Inability to get needed help prompted Andres to offer to do this work for the present. McCrea was authorized to hire a man to assist Lewis Yates, superintendent of plants for the city. Discharged service men, if available and capable of handling this job, should be given preference, councilmen stated. Mr. McCrea will consult the American Legion officials on this matter.

Mayor Allen was of the opinion that the contractor's work on the pipeline on the Abiqua would be completed by September 1.

House I-Man Revolt Over

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—A one-man campaign to reorganize the house, put Republican Joseph W. Martin in the speaker's chair and unseat democratic committee chairman, collapsed today 24 hours after it started.

Rep. Ed Rowe (R-Ohio) a freshman member, steamed up the idea, motivated by what he said was a desire to cut short "delaying tactics" and "get something done."

His complaint was aimed at the democrats who hold power by a slim margin, 216 to 212, with three seats vacant.

Martin met with Rowe this morning, told him that he and the other leaders feel such a move to be "ill-timed." The implication was that the republican leadership hopes to win control of the house at the November elections and any precedents set now might be embarrassing at some later date.

(Special to The Statesman) **DOVER ARMY AIR FIELD, Dover, Del.**—Award of the Good Conduct medal to Tech. Sgt. Charles R. Millon has been announced by Lt. Col. Edwin M. Dixon, commanding officer at Dover army air field, where the sergeant is stationed.

Sgt. Millon, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Millon, 1002 Hardcastle avenue, Woodburn, Ore., graduated from Emmett high school, Emmett, Idaho, in 1939. He was engaged in farming prior to entering the service Jan. 30, 1940. Having served overseas in the North Pacific area for 32 months, Sgt. Millon has been stationed at Dover since March 22, 1944. He is assigned as a technical inspector.

The squadron of aviators who trained here last summer at the Salem airbase is a portion of a group which recently received a presidential citation in England on recommendation of Lt. Gen. Lewis H. Brereton, commander of the Ninth US air force.

The group, first to fly the P-51 in the European theatre, is commanded by Col. George R. I. Bickell and prior to that was led by Col. Kenneth R. Martin of Missouri, who was at the Portland airbase while the fighters squadron here was in training. Col. James H. Howard, who commanded and trained the fighter squadron here,

was also commander of the group during part of its European activity.

Howard early this summer received the Congressional medal, first man so honored in the European theatre. He is with the Ninth Fighter command.

Marvin F. (Buck) Headrick, ship's cook 1/c, attached to a marine division, was wounded in action June 17 at Saipan, his wife, the former Alida Olson, has been notified. Headrick, past exalted ruler of the Salem Elks, was with the first wave of marines to go onto Saipan as he had been among the first at Tarawa.

Headrick went into the service two years ago with the seabees, later becoming attached to the marines in the Pacific. Mrs. Headrick and their three sons make their home in Salem.

The three sons of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Harold were reunited for three days last week after 3½ years of separation.

Sgt. H. Bonner Harold, just returned from 28 months overseas, the last 17 months in New Guinea, left Thursday for Camp White.

Chief Petty Officer Hal Harold has been an instructor of diesel engineering at San Diego the past year but expects to return shortly to the South Pacific. His wife ac-

companied him to Salem and will make her home here.

First Class Petty Officer Bruce Harold is at home after 33 consecutive months in the South Pacific.

DALLAS—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Nist have recently received a message written by their son, Frank Nist, Jr., 10 days earlier from Guam declaring that he was uninjured and in good health. He is with the marine raiders.

LEBANON, Aug. 15.—Calvin Jennings, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Jennings, was killed in action in France, July 18, according to a telegram received this week from the war department. He was inducted into the army in Sept. 1943, and received his preliminary training at Camp Van Dorn, Miss. The last time he was home was in March, 1944, when he had a furlough before going overseas. His twin brother, Alvin, is in the army in Italy.

Born in North Carolina the twins were brought to this vicinity when they were but a few months old and attended Lebanon grade and high schools. Shortly after graduation from high school in 1943, Calvin was married to a classmate, Margaret Fairbanks. She and their infant son, Calvin Glenn, Jr., born last May, live here. Other survivors are a brother, Blaine and three sisters, Mary Weaver and Mildred Christensen of Lebanon and Alice Durham of Los Angeles.

Truman, FDR Slate Meeting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP)—A campaign strategy mapping conference between President Roosevelt and Sen. Harry S. Truman, his fourth term running mate, is being arranged by Democratic National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan.

Hannegan, it is understood, is planning to bring the two candidates together for the first time since Truman's nomination at Chicago to replace Vice President Wallace as second man on the ticket.

Friends of Truman said they understood that final arrangements for the conference depended upon the president's schedule after his return to the capital from his Pacific tour.

Officials suggested the building be constructed after the war where the Pioneer postoffice now stands—a central site valued at \$1,700,000.

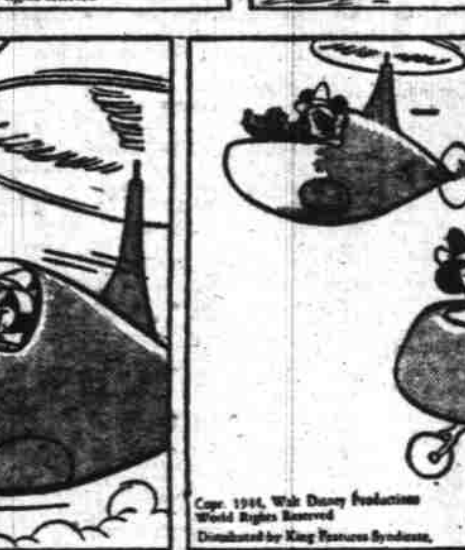
