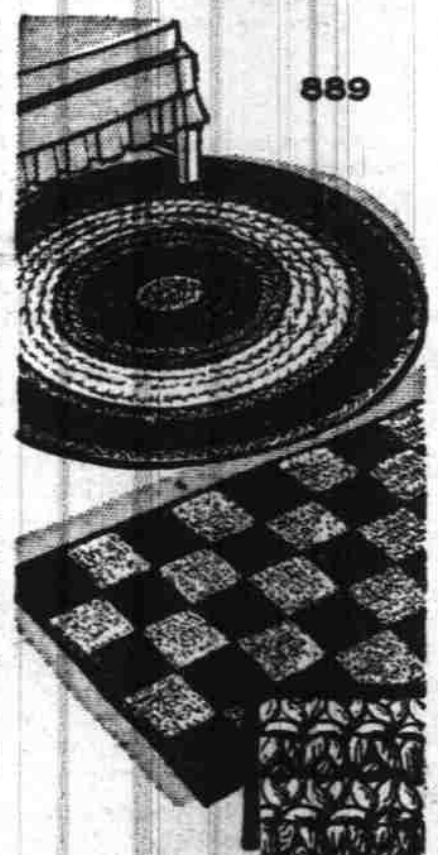
Mary Jo Rahe Has Birthday

Pfc. Webber, daughter of Mrs. Geneva G. Webber of 1575 Mill street, Salem, was a high school teacher and athletic instructor at the senior high school, Vancouver, Washington, prior to her enlistment in the Women's Army corps on June 16, 1943. She has two nephews who are army fliers.

A graduate of Oregon State college, Pfc. Webber received her basic training in the WAC at Fort Des Moines, Ia., attended army administration school at Nacodoches, Tex., served for a time at Fort Dix, N.J., and then came to Camp Upton on February 18, 1944.

Her work involves the prompt, accurate completion of the records of overseas men returning home, computation of pay rolls, so the returning soldiers may be paid, and similar duties. By regulation, the work in Pfc. Webber's section must be completed in every case within 24 hours after a soldier arrives here.

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FALSE PRETENCES Meat Pie Goes Dressy

You can chuckle up your sleeve when your family praises this intriguing dish—for it's just a glamorized meat pie topped with tasty chive biscuits. Use fresh carrots, peas, beans, potatoes, or corn—whichever you've brought in from the garden.

BAKED MEAT SKILLET

3 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup diced celery
3 tablespoons diced onion
3 tablespoons chopped green pepper
Melt butter (or margarine). Add celery, onion, and green pepper and saute lightly. Combine with meat, carrots, potatoes, and gravy. Pour into greased casserole. Top with chive drop biscuits—made by adding 1/4 cup chopped chives to regular two-cup flour drop biscuit recipe. Bake in hot (425 degrees) oven 15 to 20 minutes or until biscuits are lightly browned.

Incompatibility, nothing more or less, their mutual friends agreed, was responsible for the breaching of their marital relations.

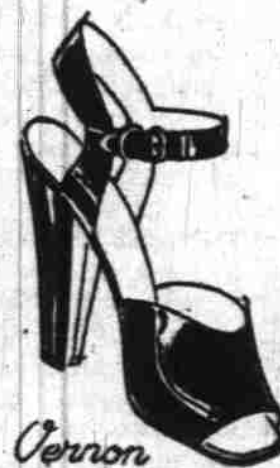
The slim, blonde Barbara said they had decided to try a "friendly separation," and although she added that there was no thought of a divorce immediately, a reconciliation seemed unlikely.
